

ALLIES GAINING GROUND IN ENEMY'S DIRECTION

London, July 20.—While a strong but unsuccessful German counter-offensive is still being fought out on the British front, the Teutonic armies find themselves again the object of a simultaneous attack on both eastern and western fronts. The recent successful advance having brought the British into line with the French at Hardecourt, the French offensive, which has been for some time in preparation, has been renewed energetically on both sides of the Somme, on a front of about five miles, thus far successfully.

Official despatches from the British and French headquarters tonight show a further advance by both armies.

The British pushed forward their line about 1,000 yards north of the Bazentin-Longueval sector, and are still fighting fiercely with the Germans in the outskirts of Longueval and in the Delville wood.

The French, having renewed their offensive, captured a considerable stretch of German trenches in the neighborhood of Estrees, and in engagements on both sides of the river

have taken nearly 3,000 additional prisoners.


At the same time, according to reports from Rome, the violent Russian offensive has been resumed in the Carpathians, at Kovel, Vladimir-Volynski and in the Riga sector. Unofficial despatches from Petrograd say that the second stage of the battle for the possession of Kovel is continuing with extreme violence. Gen. Brusiloff has brought up crushing forces from the Stokhod to the Lipa to attack the Austro-Germans, and anxiety as to their ability to withstand a continuance of the pressure is beginning to be reflected in the Berlin comments on the situation.

Military critics here discuss the new situation which has arisen, pointing out that Germany is now compelled to act on the defensive, and they speculate as to how soon Germany may find herself obliged to make retirements in an attempt to shorten her extensive but supposedly thinly held lines, especially on the eastern front.

HALIFAX LIQUOR DEALERS TO REOPEN

A Halifax despatch says: It is believed the liquor dealers, whose places of business have been closed since June 30th, when the prohibition law went into force in Halifax, will practically all re-open this week. The dealers are maintaining extreme reticence about their plans, but it is understood they have decided to re-open and await developments. The liquor men have obtained legal advice to the effect that the law is ultra vires, and the reason they have not asked for a return of their license fees is because of the effect it would have on their case. They decline to compromise themselves by asking that the fees be returned back to them. If they are prosecuted for selling a test case will be taken and in the meantime business will continue. If there is no prosecution, so much the better. The liquor dealers say they are prepared for a big legal fight.

MORE DEATHS FROM INFANTILE PARALYSIS

New York, July 20.—On only one day since the inception of the epidemic of infantile paralysis on June 26 have more fatalities from the disease occurred than in the past 24 hours.

During this period the plague killed thirty-one children and there were 119 new cases reported in the five boroughs of New York City.

The latest figures show that the mortality rate is still less than 20 per cent. Since the beginning of the epidemic there have been 487 deaths and 2,446 cases.

WAS SUNK BY AN ENEMY SUBMARINE

Berlin, July 20 (by wireless to Sayville).—The Dutch shipping council has completed its investigation of the explosion which damaged the Holland-American freighter Esemidijk in April last. It has decided, the Overseas News Agency says, that the explosion was caused by a torpedo of unknown origin.

The British Admiralty announced on April 18 that the Esemidijk, while on passage from Baltimore to Rotterdam with the Dutch colors painted on her sides, had been torpedoed by "an enemy submarine."


