The celebration was in the nature of a public dinner being served in the town hall, while the headquarters for the gathering was at the Baptist church. The descendants of this branch of the Jewett family appear to be so numerous that an association has been formed, the president of which is George A. Jewett, of Des Moines, Iowa, while James W. Jewett, of Keswick Ridge, is one of the vice-presidents.

The celebration extended over a day. Representatives were present even from the far distant Pacific coast.

This gathering of the clan will be of interest to the many Jewett families residing in New Brunswick. There are several families of that name in the province, particularly in Fredericton and other parts of York county.

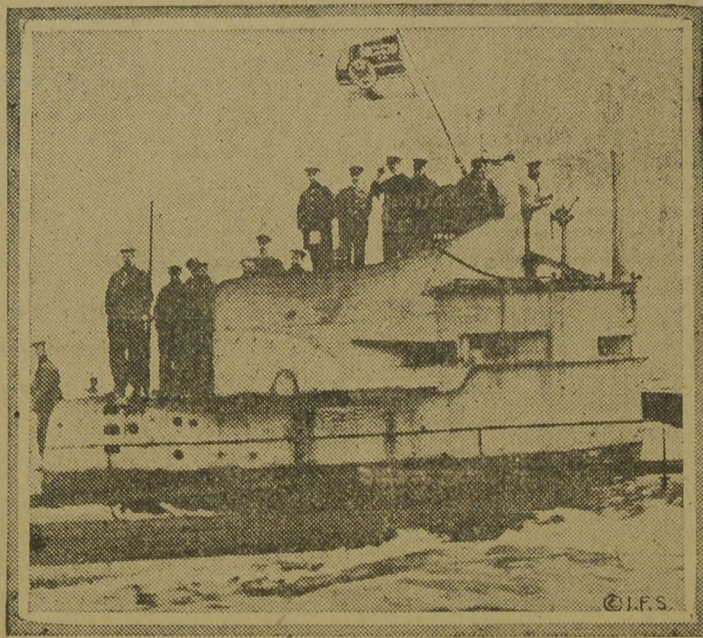
A MATRIMONIAL BOOM.

BRITISH STEAMER HAS BEEN REALSED

London, July 20.—British steamer Adams, which was captured off the Swedish coast on Tuesday by a German destroyer, has been released, according to a Berlin despatch transmitted by an Amsterdam correspondent.

Sweden made an official protest to Berlin against the capture of the vessel, claiming it was effected within Swedish territorial waters and the Berlin despatch today states that the vessel was released as soon as it was established that the seizure occurred in such waters.

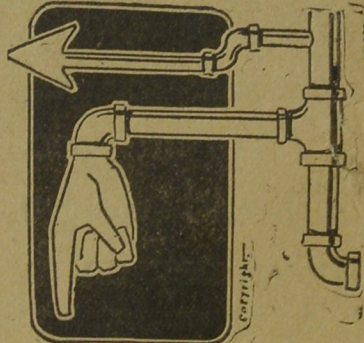

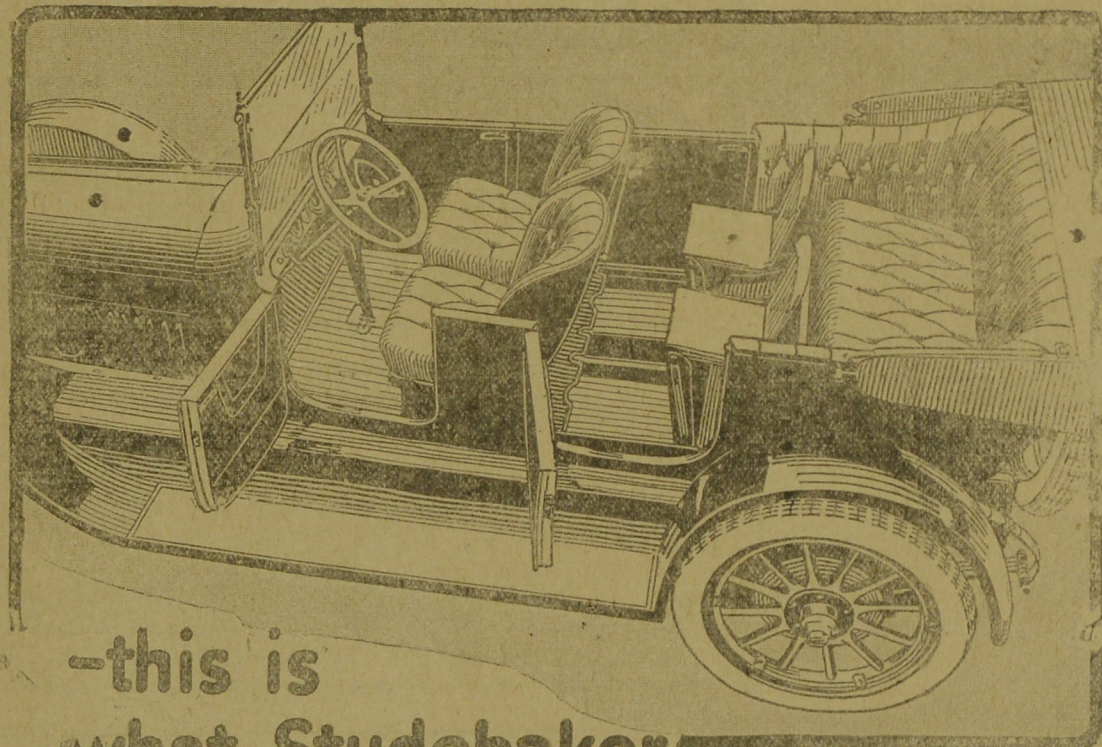
