NOMINATIONS.

Every candidate for the office of Mayor or Alderman shall be qualified to vote at the election for which he is nominated, and shall be nominated in writing by at least TWO ratepayers residing in the City of Fredericton, and qualified to vote at the ensuing election for which such candidate is

Every nomination paper with the certificate of the City Treasurer shall be filed with the City Clerk or at his office and not later than Four O'Clock on the afternoon of MONDAY, the sixth day of March, 1916, and the City Clerk, before receiving such nomination paper, shall ascertain from the same that the requirements of the Election Act have been complied with. No candidate is qualified to be nom-inated for Alderman unless at the time of nomination he is a resident of the

Ward for which he is nominated.

The acceptance of each candidate and the signatures of at least TWO resident qualified voters, who must sign the nomination paper, shall be proved by a witness by affidavit attached to the nomination.


