"HONUS" WAGNER
FORTY-TWO YEARS
OLD YESTERDAY

Has Been in Major-League
For Nineteen Years--
Is Good For Several
Years Yet.

Boston, Feb. 24.—John P. (Honus) Wagner of the Pittsburgh National League Club, is forty-two years old today. May he have many happy returns of the anniversary.

Wagner has played professional baseball for twenty-one years—in major league for nineteen—and is still a great player. If he wishes to do so he can probably continue active in the game for several years more.

Beside having a wonderfully engaging personality, Wagner has made a remarkable record. He led the National League in batting eight times and holds the major league record of seventeen years as a .300 batter. Dan Brouthers, with fourteen years, is his nearest rival, while Ty Cobb of the American League, who has batted for .300 or better for ten years, seems to be the only player with a chance to equal this great performance.

Beside being a phenomenal hitter, Wagner has been a wonderful performer of fielding stunts and a great base runner. Taken all in all, he has had the most remarkable career in baseball of any player in the game today.

He was born in Carnegie, Penn., where he now lives, February 24, 1874. He bats and throws right handed, stands 5 ft., 10½ in. and weighs 190 pounds. His first professional engagement was with Steubenville, O., in 1893.
