EMPEROR OF AUSTRIA PASSES AWAY AT SCHOENBRUN CASTLE

London, Nov. 22.—Emperor Francis Joseph died last night at 9 o'clock at Schoenbrunn Castle, according to a Reuter despatch from Vienna, by way of Amsterdam.

The first intimation here that Emperor Francis Joseph's health was once more the subject of alarm, was contained in a despatch dated Nov. 12.

Subsequent reports, more or less conflicting, represented that his condition was becoming worse, but none of them indicated that his illness threatened to reach a critical state, and from Vienna came assurances that he was still able to give audiences to one or more ministers daily.

What gave some credence to the suspicion that his condition was much graver than the official bulletins indicated, was the report—which still lacks official confirmation, that it had been decided to associate the heir to the throne, Archduke Charles Francis,

in the government of the country, and that he was to assume the position on Dec. 2, the 68th anniversary of the Emperor's ascension to the throne.

So far as known here, the Archduke Charles is still at the front in command of his army.

His Successor.

Archduke Charles Francis, grand nephew of Emperor Francis Joseph, became heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary by the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand prior to the outbreak of the war.

He has been in command of the Austrian armies on various fronts during the past two years.

Archduke Charles Francis was born on Aug. 17, 1887. His wife was Princess Zita, of the Bourbon House of Parma. His father was the Archduke Otto, who was the younger brother of Francis Ferdinand.

TO HOLD NATIONAL SERVICE WEEK IN JANUARY

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Preparations are being made by R. B. Bennett, M. P., and the National Service directorate for the proposed National Service week beginning the first of January. Within the next fortnight several hundred thousand circulars will be sent out and this will be followed by an extensive advertising campaign, while fully a million cards will be issued. They are supposed to be filled in and returned.

The idea in view is an inventory of the man power of Canada, and to ascertain definitely what each able bodied man is doing, whether serving the Empire at home or abroad, engaged in an industry vital to the country, disqualified physically for service, whether the work is of such a character as could be done by women, or whether no real barrier to enlistment exists.

From such an undertaking, it is anticipated that not only will certain necessary industries secure the men they need, but that any deficiency in recruiting to the proposed total will be supplied.

It is being emphasized anew, however, that the popular conception of the National Service Commission is wrong. It is not a recruiting organization. That work still rests with the military. It is designed to ascertain the man power of the country.

FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—The explosive department of the Imperial Munitions Board is prepared to give employment to returned soldiers in connection with the construction and operation of explosives and chemical plants which are being erected in Canada on behalf of the British government.

Not only are ordinary laborers required, but positions are available for skilled workmen.

Large plants are being erected and operated at Trenton and Renfrew, Ont. Workmen of various trades are required at once and preference will in every case be given to returned soldiers, if they are willing to accept permanent positions.

The S.S. Britannic Was Torpedoed

LONDON, Nov. 22.—The hospital ship Britannic was sunk by a mine or a torpedo yesterday morning in the Aegean Sea, according to the official statement. There were 1,106 survivors of whom about 28 were injured. Full particulars of the disaster, it is announced, will be published as received.

The Britannic was a White Star Line ship of 47,500 tons, and was said to be the largest afloat. She was built in 1914 at Belfast and was 822 feet long. (See also 1st page.)

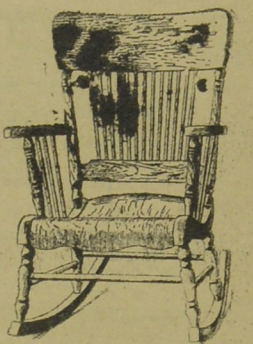

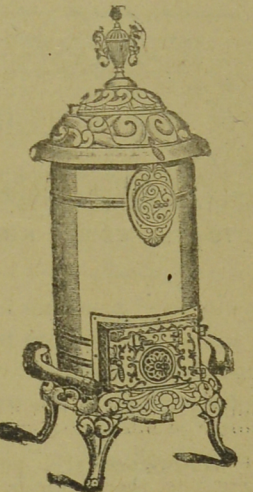
