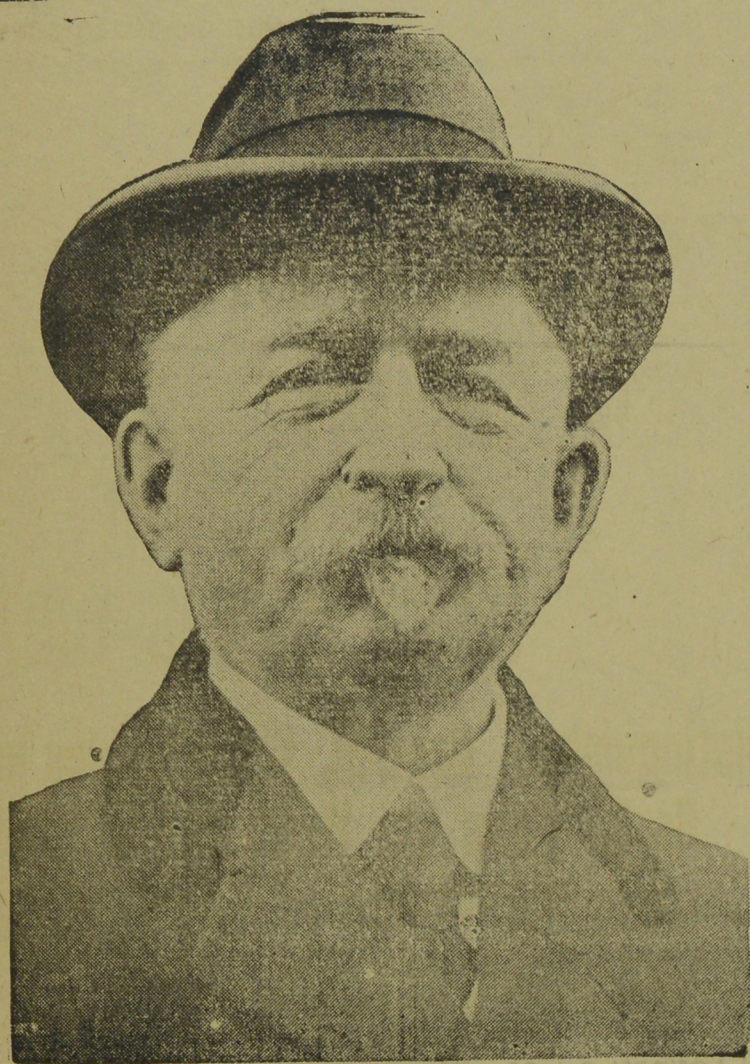


"CANADA, EMPIRE IN ITSELF, BIGGEST ROLE IN FUTURE"



BARON SHAUGHNESSY.

New York, Oct. 25.—Baron Shaughnessy, in an interview granted a representative of the Canadian Press, as he was about to board the steamer Kronland, en route to Europe, predicted a greater Canada, industrially and politically when peace is declared.

"Though bleeding with sacrifice and bending with effort in behalf of the great Empire, of which she is an integral part," he said, "Canada's biggest role in the play of nations is not now, but in the future."

The history of the Dominion, he said, showed that what mistakes have had

to be rectified have been due to short vision, and that the deeds most criticized had been of over-anticipation. As between these two, Canada would, after the war, steer a middle course of steady development.

"Canada is an empire in itself," continued Baron Shaughnessy. "Its population is not a fraction of what it should be, of what it is capable of becoming, or of what it will be after the war. We are now taking steps to prepare for the future, and are anticipating a nimmigration that should be unprecedented in Canada's history."

FEMALE GRAFTERS AND THE PATRIOTIC FUND

Nova Scotia Paper Complains of Numerous Fraudulent Trans- actions.

Our sympathy goes out to the Patriotic Fund Committee, who are trying to administer without loss, the best interests of the fund. They not only have, on the one hand, the humiliating fact that Cumberland's contribution is totally inadequate to meet the situation, and levies have to be made continually on the central fund; but they have, on the other hand, a whole lot of grafters, largely of the female persuasion, who see in the fund an opportunity to enrich themselves and who are willing to stoop to any deception in order to get their hands on the ill-deserved gains. We are told of an instance where two sisters co-operated together so that the one whose husband was at the front could take care of the other's child and thus secure a larger per capita levy from the fund. We are told of another instance where two women who have actually left their husbands, and are living with other men, have persisted in claiming the fund's protection, which was never intended for harlots, and have kept up their lying and deception in order to hold their slimy gains. These fraudulent transactions are not easy to run down. They take time and energy, and while the totals may not be large, it is certain that if the committee were not constantly on the alert the whole treasury would be exploited by people who had no claim upon the fund whatever. It is easy to talk of graft in politics. Instances, like the above, of female grafting have been exposed the country over, and the total would be greater than what has been exposed by all the scandal investigations since the beginning of the war.

Those who maintain that the war is having a vast uplifting influence on humanity have quite a proposition on their hands at times to uphold their claims, when confronted with widespread instances of depravity such as these.

ADMIRALTY DENIES A GERMAN YARN

London, Oct. 25.—The British Admiralty issued last night a note stating that there was no truth in the German Admiralty's account of the battle of German and British aeroplanes off the coast of Flanders on Monday afternoon. The German Admiralty asserted that the two seaplanes defeated a hostile squadron of three hydroplanes and two battleplanes and that one hydroplane was shot down by a German.

The British Admiralty in its note reports the truth of its own account of the aerial fight, in which it was stated that one British naval aeroplane attacked four hostile seaplanes off Ostend, destroyed one and drove off the others.

The British naval machine returned safely and undamaged, says the British Admiralty.

Twenty Austrian Battalions Cut to Pieces in Recent Fighting.

Petrograd, Oct. 25.—Twenty battalions of Austrian Infantry which took part in the attack against the Russian forces at Kiribaba, in the Carpathians, were cut to pieces in the fighting of October 21, according to the reports received here.

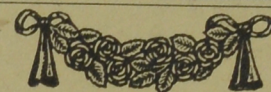
The 31st Regiment of Infantry was almost completely annihilated. Of the regiment of 850 men there were only 100 survivors.

FIRE AT ST. CATHARINES.

Loss About \$40,000.—Fire Caused by Upsetting of a Lamp.

St. Catharines, Ont., Oct. 25.—Fire totally destroyed a frame structure 225 feet by 50 feet on section 2, Welland Ship Canal, erected and owned by Baldry, Yerburch & Hutchinson, contractors, and used as an engine house, machine shop, blacksmith shop and storehouse.

The fire was caused by the upsetting of an oil lamp. All the contents were destroyed except the locomotives, which were moved out. The loss will be about \$40,000, only partly covered by insurance.

FINES IMPOSED ON LAVAL STUDENTS

Montreal, Oct. 25.—Judgment was delivered this morning by Recorder Semple in the police court in the cases of the four Laval students who were arrested in the disturbance of October 4th. All were found guilty.

Romeo Laporte, for throwing stones at the police in front of St. James Cathedral, was fined \$25 and costs, or two months in jail. Emile Tasse and Arthur Grenier, for creating a disturbance and tearing down recruiting posters, were each ordered to pay half the costs of the prosecution or go to jail for two weeks.

Arthur Brassard was allowed out on suspended sentence.

Yesterday the board of control refused to dismiss Police Captain Dice for his alleged discourtesy to Alderman Dubeau at the time of the disturbance.
