DUMB CAKE RECIPE.

The dumb cake must be mixed between 10 and 11 o'clock on All Hallow's Eve, according to the ancient recipe, then set before the fire "to rise" until midnight. The time for mixing the dumb cake and for its rising must be shortened to about fifteen minutes in order to fit in a modern crowded Hallow-e'en program.

The girls of the party must mix the dumb cake in the kitchen. Each girl places a handful of wheat flour on a sheet of paper, and sprinkle over it as much salt as she can hold between her finger and thumb. Then one of the party mixes the dough, taking care not to use spring water.

The dough is then divided, and each girl rolls it up once, spreads it out thin, and marks her initials upon it with a brand-new pin. The cakes are placed before the fire, and the maidens sit in silence as far from them as possible. Before the clock strikes 12 the girls must turn the cakes once. Not a word

must be spoken from the time of me suring the flour until the men enter at mid-night.


The first man to find the cake marked with his true love's name will marry her within a year. Any girl who speaks before a man speaks to her 'breaks the charm.'

JELLIED NUTS.

Set one-fourth box of gelatin in one-fourth cup cold water, dissolve it in one cup of boiling water, sweeten with three-fourths cup of sugar, flavor with one cup orange juice and three tablespoons lemon juice. Spread one-half the quantity over the bottom of a shallow porcelain pan and when partially cold cover with any kind of nut meats. Add remainder of gelatin and chill. Serve with sweetened whipped cream.


All employers of labor in said district willing to give preference to returned disabled soldiers as employees and all returned discharged soldiers wanting employment residing therein are requested to notify the secretary.
