## RUSSIAN STEAM ROLLER MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

Petrograd, June 15.—The Russian advance along the whole southwestern front continues to develop with a degree of swiftness which has astonished the country. The success of the movement thus far is looked upon as the more remarkable in view of the strong defences which had been erected by the Austrians during the long period of preparation and their supposed readiness for resistance to any manner of assault.

The outstanding features are the steadily mounting number of prisoners augmented by the surrender of large Austrian units in their entirety; the wholesale abandonment of military trains, and all sorts of field equipment in such enormous quantities that they cannot yet be estimated, and finally, so far as is known here, the comparatively small extent of Russian losses.

Except in the centre of the front which runs from Volhynia to the Rumanian border, the Austrians have been wholly unable to resist the Russian drive.

More than 150,000 men have been captured during the offensive movement on the Volhynian and Galician fronts, it was announced officially today.

The Russian statement yesterday announced the capture of 1,780 officers, nearly 120,000 men, 130 cannon and 260 machine guns. It is probable that the difference between those figures and the ones given in today's statement does not represent the captures made in the interval between the issuance of the two statements, but rather that the increases are due to the receipt of more detailed information from the front.

### Official Statement.

The following statement was given out officially:

"Supplementary reports give the exact number of prisoners taken as one general, three commanders, 2,407 officers, five doctors and 150,000 men.

"We also captured 163 cannon, 266 machine guns, 139 bomb-throwers and 32 mine-throwers.

"The offensive of General Brusiloff did not stop yesterday. In various regions on the front fresh prisoners were made and more military booty was taken. The enemy continues to deliver counter attacks at several points and elsewhere is busy entrenching himself in new positions.

"In the Baltic on the night of May 31-June 1, our torpedo boats attacked a convoy of enemy steamers sailing under escort. During the engagement we sank two steamers of a small type and one auxiliary cruiser, whose crew we captured.

"There was no loss or damage on our side. We refrained from pursuing the enemy steamers because during the engagement they took their course into Swedish territorial waters."

## ACCIDENTAL DEATH IS VERDICT OF THE JURY

A verdict of accidental death, with blame attaching to no person, was brought in last night by the coroner's jury which inquired into the death of Stephen W. Bishop, who was killed in Mr. W. D. Gunter's mill last Tuesday morning.

The verdict brought was as follows:

That the said Stephen W. Bishop came to his death by an accident caused by a blow from an iron or steel bar while in the act of trying to shift a pulley with the bar, while the pulley was in motion, and we find that no blame is to be attached to the employer or the employees of the mill.

The inquest was held in the office of Dr. B. M. Mullin, coroner, at St. Mary's. Several employees of the mill gave evidence. Dr. C. P. Holden of Fredericton, who conducted the autopsy, also gave evidence.

## Official report of Turkish War Office

Constantinople, June 16 (via London).—A further withdrawal of the British below Kut-el-Amara, on the Tigris, after the recent repulse by the Turks of an attempt to advance, is reported in a statement today by the Turkish War Office, which follows:

"On the Mesopotamian front—Disturbed by our artillery fire, the enemy removed his camp from Felahie (on the Tigris below Kut-el-Amara) far beyond the reach of our guns.

"Russian troops which we met near Kilan, southwest of Kaserin, were driven off."

### THURSDAY HALF-HOLIDAY.

## Big find of Dynamite At Ford City, Ont.

(Canadian Press.)

Ford, Ont. June 16.—One hundred and twenty sticks of dynamite, enough to blow the town off the map, was discovered late last night by workmen engaged in a factory here. The explosive was found hidden in the back part of the building, on the second floor. There were twelve packages, with ten sticks in each package.

The building in which the stuff was discovered was formerly used by a concern engaged in the manufacture of ammunition, but which went out of existence recently and the factory was taken over by another industry. Officials of the former ammunition company declare no dynamite was used in their manufacturing. The Ford police were at first inclined to believe that the dynamite was a part of that which Kaitzschmidt, the arch-conspirator had brought out, but this is disapproved by the provincial police, who assert that the factory was thoroughly searched, following the confessions of Respa and Laffer, charged with dynamiting. This being the case, the explosive was evidently placed where it was found quite recently.

## More Canadian Officers Killed

Ottawa, June 16.—Six officers killed, one believed to be killed, and thirty-two wounded comprise the officers' casualty list today. All are from Montreal, Toronto and points west.

## Ex-German Steamer Bound for St. John

London, June 16.—The steamship Molte, formerly belonging to the Hamburg-American Line, which was seized by the Italian government in August, 1914, has sailed from Genoa for St. John, and passed Gibraltar on Tuesday last.

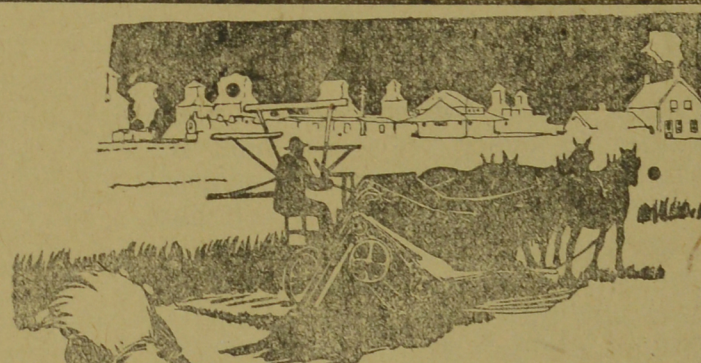
