The invalid accepted her caress passively, but after an instant's pause, she said:

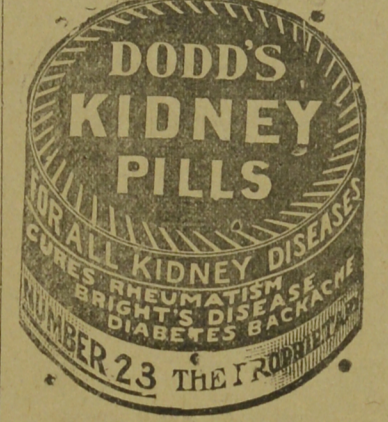
"Will might be—want not like it if you disappoint him. I'll try to wait till you come back."

Instead of the frill, the silk might be arranged in three rows of cordings, or the ordinary waist band could be adopted covered by a picturesque sash.

Women are really very loyal to a fabric when they like it. They talk much about wanting originality in material and they often look long and lovingly at the dressmakers or offerings in the shops, but when the looking and longing are over they are quite apt to come back to the stand-bys.

Two Good Old Stand-bys.

Whatever notice there is also of silver lace mounted on rose-colored tulle, which extends across the bust in broad folds. The straight shoulder straps are of wide silver braid held

together by a double band of the tulle, and the belt, which is of old rose satin, is fastened with a square rhinestone buckle in front, which in itself is a decided novelty for the evening.
