THROWN FROM CARRIAGE.

Mr. William Rickard Sr., of Barker's Point, while driving at Marysville this morning, was thrown from his carriage at the I.R.C. crossing, near the residence of Coun. D.E. Rickard, the horse taking fright from the train. He was stunned by the fall but later recovered.

POLICE INVESTIGATION.

The investigation to be held tomorrow afternoon of the charges preferred by ex-Police Sgt. Durcan and ex-Policeman Wm. Saunders against Chief McCollom and Policeman Marshall is to be private. Hon. J. E. M. Baxter, the attorney general, communicating with the Police Commission with regard to an investigation, advised that one be held, but stated that he himself had no power to order one.

CANADIAN BAR ASSN.

Mr. A. R. Slipp, K.C., M.P.P. of this city, is among the New Brunswick barristers in attendance at the meeting of the Canadian Bar Association at Toronto. As president of the New Brunswick bar, Mr. Slipp delivered a reply to the address of welcome presented by the Ontario bench and bar. A feature of the evening session was an address by Hon. J. M. Beck, who made a powerful arraignment of Germany, its violation of pledges and outrages on humanity.

HOLDING CONFERENCE.

City Engineer George McKnight and representatives of the Palmer-McLellan Shoe Pack Company are conferring today concerning the dispute between company and city. The operation of erecting the tower for the sprinkler system has been held up until the City Council meets and decides whether it will permit it to be partially on city land. City Engineer McKnight objects to permitting connection with the city water mains until full details of the sprinkler system are filed with the city.

ST. JOHN MEN IN LUCK.

Mr. Abraham Gunter, a former resident of Upper Georgetown, who died recently in British Columbia, has bequeathed his property to his nephews, A. G. McMullin and W. E. Gunter of St. John. Mr. McMullin is a son of the late Capt. John McMullin of St. John, and a brother of Mrs. A. Fenton Kierstead of this city. A St. John paper says that the legacy will probably amount to \$40,000 or over but this is an exaggeration. The estate left by Mr. Gunter, according to relatives, consists of farm property worth between \$5000 and \$10,000.

GOING TO VALCARTIER.

The 15th Battalion will leave for Valcartier camp on Monday, June 19, according to official advice received at headquarters of the New Brunswick command yesterday. The 132nd Battalion will be the next to follow leaving on the 20. The 140th will leave on the 22, the 145th, stationed at Moncton, will leave on the 25; the 105th, also in that city, will leave for Valcartier on the 28. This announcement means that the 104th is the only battalion to remain in New Brunswick until the date for them to sail overseas, which will be before many days, probably the last week in June.

LATE WILLIAM COLLINS.

The remains of the late William Collins arrived from St. John this morning. Solemn High Mass was celebrated at St. Dunstan's church by Rev. Father Carney. Interment was made at Hanwell. The deceased passed away yesterday at St. John after a lingering illness, at the age of forty-five years. He is survived by a widow and by his mother, Mrs. William Collins of Grand Lake. Other surviving relatives are four brothers, James of Boiestown, Charles of St. John, Jeremiah of Grand Lake, Robert in the West, and three sisters, Mrs. Michael Lane, Mrs. Richard Isaacs and Mrs. Frank McDermott of St. John.

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CO. AND CITY LIKELY

TO REACH AGREEMENT

City Council Looked Ground Over at Factory This Afternoon—City Engineer Explained Position Re Water Service.

It is expected that the city and the Palmer-McLellan Shoe Pack Company will reach an agreement in the dispute which arose out of the installation of a sprinkler-system at the company's factory, York street. This afternoon the City Council in a body is looking over the ground in the vicinity of the factory for the purpose of coming to a decision. The work on the foundations of the tower which is to support the tank of the sprinkler-system is being continued by the company. Two of the concrete supports of the tower encroached on the extension of Aberdeen street, which is city property. It is to the erection of these that the city has objected.

City Engineer McKnight conferred with representatives of the company yesterday afternoon with regard to the service-pipe which will connect with the city water-main in York street. The city engineer maintained that there should be a gate on the service-pipe by which firemen on arriving at the factory, might shut off the water from the sprinkling-system in order to avoid diminishing water-pressure elsewhere. Representatives of the company agreed to his suggestion.

Inability to shut water off from factory sprinkler system after the factories had been destroyed greatly handicapped the firemen at Salem, Mass., a couple of years ago, with the result that much of the town was destroyed.

COUNTY COURT TO

TAX COSTS IN CASE

OF FRED ELLIOT

Judge Wilson Will Act in Spite of Supreme Court Judgement—Important Decision in Woodsman's Lien Cases.

His Honor Judge Wilson gave judgment this morning on five cases. Court adjourned until June 23, on which date costs will be taxed in the case of The King vs Fred Elliott. This is the famous case from Southampton which arose out of a disturbance at a meeting held for the benefit of the Belgian Relief Fund on Christmas Eve, 1914. The County Court takes this action in the face of the decision of the Supreme Court on an appeal.

Judgments were as follows: The King, on the information of Bowman, et al, vs Fred Elliott. Judgment was that the County Court still had control of the order of April 15, 1915, in spite of judgment of the Supreme Court and that it would, on June 23, proceed to tax costs and do other matters necessary. All parties were notified to be present on that day.

J. F. VanBuskirk vs Samuel Draper. Judgment was for the plaintiff on the note and costs.

Bertram M. Dunham and George Christie vs George Marsten. (The case was tried in March and resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff. Subsequently Mr. P. J. Hughes moved for a new trial. His Honor this morning refused a new trial.)

Melvin Teed vs Ora D. Northrop. In this case lien was filed and the provisions of the Woodsman's Lien Act. The court held that the lien would not hold because it was against sawn lumber and consequently was destroyed.

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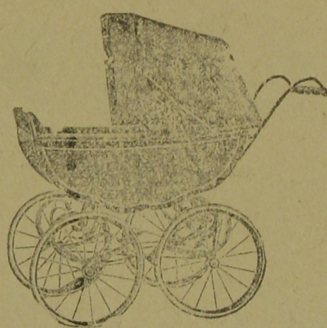

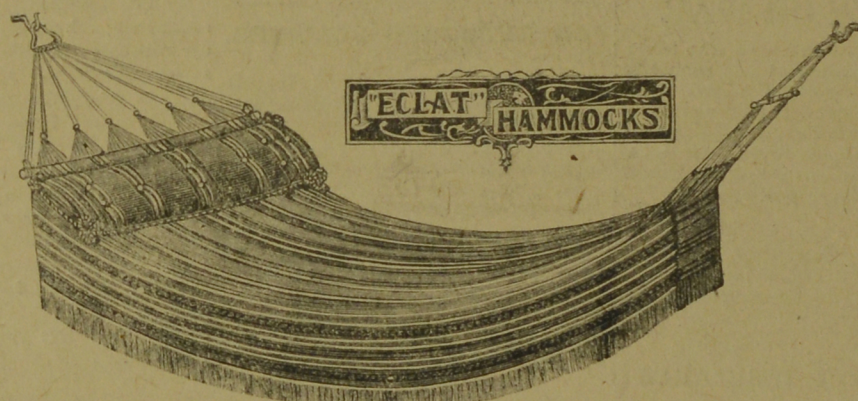
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
