## Company Without Stock.

A company known as Soldiers' Comfort Association, with headquarters in St. John, has been incorporated under provincial charter for the purpose of raising funds for the assistance of soldiers in the field. ## Preparing for 132nd.

An advance party of the unit is expected at Sussex on Thursday and the main body of the troops will arrive there on Saturday.

## Andover Circuit Court.

Judge Crockett presided at the Andover Circuit Court which opened on Tuesday. In the case of three men named Baillie, Legasse and Parent, charged with assault, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. Messrs. T. J. Carter, K.C., and C. H. Elliott appealed for the crown and Messrs. A. R. Slipp, K.C., and A. M. Chamberland for the accused.

## The Lynch Estate.

Mr. R. B. Hanson, who has been appointed a special commissioner to look into the matter of succession duties in connection with the estate of the late Mr. Timothy Lynch, of this city, held a sitting of his court yesterday. He heard the evidence of Judge Barry and Mr. James Robinson, executors of the estate, and also that of Mr. E. A. McCurdy, manager of the Royal Bank at Newcastle. Mr. F. B. Carvell, K.C., appeared as counsel for Mrs. Lynch.

## Rapid Progress.

Rapid progress is being made in the remodelling of the front of the F. B. Edgecombe Co. store. The brickwork is to be removed and a new front of concrete blocks installed, supported on a steel girder across the show windows. The third floor of the new front will be lighted by eight windows, the second by two large plateglass windows, with two small windows on the side, and the ground floor will be lighted by an arcade front.

## Kingsclear Assault Case.

The charges of assault and of doing grievous bodily harm against James Mills, on the information of Milton Poore, were heard in the police court yesterday afternoon and this morning. The offences are alleged to have been committed on September 8th at Central Kingsclear. A number of witnesses were examined. The trouble resulted from difficulties which had arisen between the parties concerned. Judgment will be given on October 4th.

## Baby Moose Dies.

The baby moose which was one of the mascots of the 236th Highlanders, died yesterday. Congestion of the lungs, it is thought, caused its death. Dr. G. C. McCoy was summoned to attend it, but veterinary skill could do nothing. The animal was the gift of Mr. Herbert Stairs, of Southampton. An effort will be made to obtain another moose mascot. "Sir Sam," the deceased mascot, is not to leave the battalion entirely. His hide is to form a rug for the officers' mess and his hoofs inkwells for the battalion office.

## Pacer Broke Leg.

James K. Newbro, 213½, the fast pacing gelding owned by Mr. Hamilton G. Kitchen, of this city, broke his leg this afternoon at the Fredericton Trotting Park, after being driven an exhibition mile by Driver Tommy Raymond. The gelding, after finishing the mile, made a misstep which resulted in the accident. He had covered the mile in 2.13 and the half in 1.05. Dr. G. C. McCoy was summoned at once to attend the injured animal. At the time of writing it was not known whether or not it would be necessary to destroy the horse. James K. Newbro is one of the fastest pacers owned in this section. He had a particularly good season in 1915.

LIEUT. D. B. WINSLOW  
AT BOULOGNE, NOT  
SERIOUSLY WOUNDED

Lieut. Frank J. Sherman is Paymaster of 4th Divisional Supply Column in France--New Maryland Man Wounded.

A cablegram was received this morning by Mr. J. J. F. Winslow from Lieut. Donald B. Winslow, formerly of Fredericton. The contents were: "Wounded, not serious."

The cablegram was from Boulogne. It was known some days ago that Lieut. Winslow had been wounded, but his name has not yet appeared in the official casualty list.

Lieut. Winslow left Canada attached to the 64th Battalion, but was transferred to the 5th Mounted Rifles.

Lieut. Jaseper A. Winslow, brother of Mr. J. J. F. Winslow, is now in France. In a letter he states that Lieut. Frank J. Sherman, formerly of Fredericton, is paymaster of the 4th Divisional Supply Column, an Army Service Corps Unit, now in France.

## Other Casualties.

Private Oliver Gray, of New Maryland, appears in the casualty list as wounded. Private C. Bolden, of Min., is reported died of wounds.

## Recruiting in Sunbury.

Lieut. Col. W. H. Gray, Capt. J. P. McPeake, Lieut. Ray Brewer and Sgt. Major H. T. Brewer, addressed a recruiting meeting at Geary last night on behalf of the 236th Battalion. CITY SCHOOL BOARD  
HELD ITS REGULAR  
MONTHLY MEETING

Application of Mr. R. L. Phillips to Have Pupil Transferred Was Refused--More Accommodation For the High School.

The monthly meeting of the School Board was held yesterday with Dr. G. C. VanWart presiding. The other members in attendance included Mrs. Cox, Mr. Weddall, Mr. Lemont, Mr. Shute and the Secretary.

Mr. R. L. Phillips was present by invitation, and made a request to have one of his daughters admitted to a school outside the boundary in which she lives. Mr. Phillips presented several reasons why he was desirous of having his daughter attend this particular school.

Subsequently the board devoted considerable time to the request made, and as the board at a previous meeting ordered that the boundaries be strictly adhered to, particularly in regard to Grades VII and VIII, it was decided that Mr. Phillips' request could not be granted. It seems that there are other similar requests which would have to be dealt with if one were granted.

## Children's Day.

A letter was read from the Chief Supt. of Education re the appeal made by the Lieut. Governor for the recognition of Children's Day in the public schools, to provide aid for destitute Belgian children. This is expected to be obtained from proceeds of concerts, sports and other entertainments, but it is not expected that the children will either collect or contribute money. 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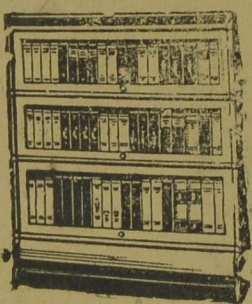
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
