CHANGES AMONG C. P. R. OFFICIALS

Mr. W. B. Howard, D. P. Agent at St. John to Change Places With Mr. M. G. Murphy at Toronto.

Montreal, Jan. 21—A railway with such interests and so many ramifications as the C.P.R. requires in the more responsible positions officials have held posts at different points in the system and there is, therefore, a constant flux and change of agents and general agents. With the organization of the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, particularly in the Orient, there has been an unusually large number of changes in the passenger department, all with the object of strengthening the system and educating the officers to every phase of business which they may have to handle. A new passenger agency has been established at Buffalo with L. R. Hart, formerly of the New York office, as general agent. G. M. Jackson goes from the railway office at San Francisco to the Ocean Services at Yokohama, where his title is general agent passenger department. A. J. Blagden goes from St. Louis to Shanghai. A. O. Shaw has left Winnipeg to take up his new duties in the passenger traffic department at Montreal. G. A. Walton, formerly of Chicago, has taken Mr. Shaw's place as general passenger agent at Winnipeg; T. J. Wall, formerly general agent passenger department at Minneapolis, is transferred to Chicago and is succeeded at Minneapolis by R. S. Elworthy, formerly of Chicago; M. G. Murphy, district passenger agent at Toronto, changes places on February 1 with W. B. Howard, district passenger agent at St. John. All these changes mean a host of other changes which enable men who might otherwise be confined to the experience of one officer to have an opportunity of other work which gives them a wider knowledge of traffic conditions over the whole system.

(There will be general regret among patrons of the road over the news of Mr. Howard's transfer. All will be glad, however, to know that he is to be succeeded by Mr. M. G. Murphy, who is a St. John boy and one of the brightest young men in the C.P.R. service.)

NEW PROGRAM OF FEATURES
