BENNY KAUFF NOT
SATISFIED WITH GIANTS

New York, Jan. 20—Benny Kauff, the Tu Cobb of the Federal League, said today that he is not satisfied with the deal the Giants made with Harry Sinclair, the "auctioneer" for the defunct league, and that he will not play with McGraw's clan unless he gets what he demands.

"I did not know anything about my sale until late Monday night, when this telegram was sent to me by Hempstead:

"I have taken over your Federal League contract and you are now a member of organized baseball."

"It looks as if they were trying to rub it into me again," said Kauff. "I ask only what is fair."

"Hempstead refused to consider my claim. I left the office and I have not seen them since."

"I am not going to sign a contract with the Giants unless they give me what I want. If Hempstead and McGraw want me to play for them they know where to get me."

RUSSIANS ARE MAKING
HEADWAY IN THE EAST

London, Jan. 20—The British official statement, issued tonight, says: "In the course of fourteen fights in the air yesterday we drove two enemy machines down into the German lines. During the day we lost one aeroplane."

"Today we exploded a mine near Fricourt. An enemy aeroplane dropped three bombs on the outskirts of an unimportant village behind our lines."

"Generally on the front the day passed quietly. There was less artillery firing than usual and there is nothing of importance to report."

NORWEGIAN VESSEL
WAS BURNED AT SEA

(Canadian Press.)

New York, Jan. 20—The British steamer Penistone arrived today from Havre and reported having sighted in the night of January 2 a vessel on fire at latitude 47.08, longitude 23.16 east. The Penistone steamed around the burning ship during the night in vain search for lifeboats. Soon after daylight the officers said, they made out the burning craft to be a sailing ship which had a Norwegian flag painted on her starboard side. The Penistone again steamed around the vessel, which had almost burned to the water's edge but failed to find any trace of lifeboats.

ADD TO GROUND GAINED.

Petrograd, via London, Jan. 20—official communication, issued today from general headquarters, reads as follows:

"In the region of Dvinsk our artillery successfully bombarded an enemy column which approached Schlorberg from the west. On the Middle Stripa we stopped an attempt by weak enemy units to approach our trenches."

"North of Sernowitz, in the region of Ranczke, we captured the sector of an enemy position. In an attempt to re-capture the sector the enemy made five desperate counter-attacks, all of which were repulsed with enormous enemy losses."

"On the Black Sea, on January 17, our torpedo boats raided the Anatolian coast, destroying 163 sailing vessels, 73 of which were loaded with various commodities. Thirty men were taken prisoners. Other vessels made their escape on our appearance."

"Caucasus front: Our troops continue their pursuit of the centre of the Turkish army. Despite the great strength of the Turkish forces and the excessively difficult local conditions, our troops developed considerable success from their coup. The enemy was thrown from his positions and retired, suffering severe losses, not only in men but in war material of all kinds."

"According to latest particulars, we captured, at the Town of Kopruckui, near Erzerum, guns, munitions, artillery and prisoners."

"The emperor, hearing of this blow against the Turks, has ordered his sincere gratitude to be expressed to the gallant troops for their exploits and their self-sacrificing services."

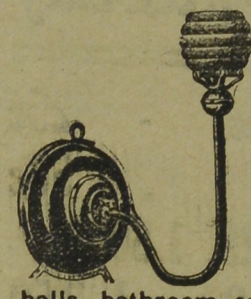

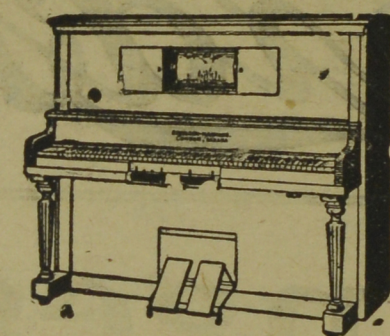

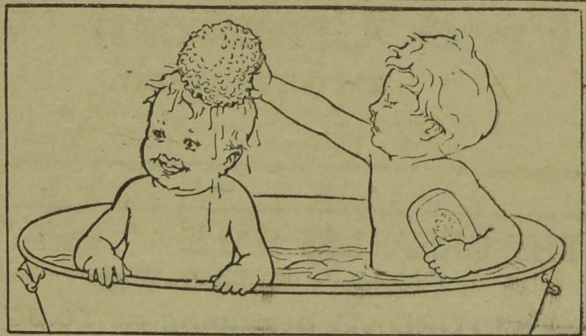
