GERMAN MINE LAYER FORMIDABLE CRAFT

The Prize is Now in a Naval Dockyard on the East Coast of England.

London, July 21.—The German submarine mine layer which is one of the U-35 class, one of the latest prizes of the British navy, was visited by a reporter today prior to its being placed on public exhibition in the Thames.

The prize, flying the German naval ensign surmounted by the British ensign, lay in a naval dockyard on the east coast. The vessel is designed purely for mine laying. The entire forward part is composed of wells, six in number, each containing two powerful mines, which can be released by levers.

The ship has no torpedo tubes or other armament except small arms for the crew and is only 100 feet in length.

Thirteen bluejackets and officers comprise the crew of the submarine. According to one of the seamen, she made prior to her capture nineteen trips from the base in Germany to the British coast, and laid over two hundred mines in routes frequented by merchant vessels. She was on her twentieth trip when she was captured by the British patrol boat. The sailors said that when the submarine was sighted and chased by a patrol boat the crew tried to get rid of her remaining mines, but had not sufficient time.

All of the crew were taken prisoners.

APPLE CROP

Montreal and other Canadian cities are taking a larger quantity of New Brunswick strawberries each season. Raspberries will be the next crop, and promises well. Plums are reported to be in good condition. Black knot has injured many trees in recent years, however. Pears are not grown in large quantities.

Agricultural Conditions.

Mr. J. B. Daggett, Secretary of Agriculture, informs the Mail that agricultural conditions are good. The hay crop is the heaviest in years. All that is wanted is a period of hot weather to cure it. Much hay was got out of the fields on Thursday and Friday.

The British War Office has asked for an estimate of New Brunswick's hay crop, but so far there have been no orders for the new crop. The market is firm.

Potatoes are looking well, but Mr. Daggett believes it too early to make any predictions as to yield. Potash, which has been used in large quantities by New Brunswick potato growers, could not be obtained this year. It is of German manufacture and is completely off the market. What effect the absence of potash will have on the potato crop remains to be seen. Some believe that its beneficial effects have been exaggerated and that without the aid of potash there will be a good potato yield.

Turnips and other root crops are looking well, and the same is true of oats and other grains. Buckwheat is an exception. Planting of this crop was very late. It is also true that the yield of this particular grain, so closely associated with New Brunswick in years gone by, has steadily decreased, with the result that less has been planted.

Other crops have been substituted for buckwheat in many cases.

GUNNER WM. LAWSON REPORTED SLIGHTLY WOUNDED

Admitted to Hospital at Calais With Wound in the Left Leg.

Mr. A. C. M. Lawson this morning received an official telegram from Ottawa informing him that his son, Gunner William Lawson, No. 85,738, artillery, had been admitted to No. 30 General Hospital, Calais, France, on July 10th, with slight wound in the left leg.

Gunner Lawson was an undergraduate at the University of New Brunswick when he enlisted in the fall of 1914 in the 24th Field Battery here.

He has been in France for upwards of a year.

Private David M. Owen, of Minto, Infantry, is reported wounded. Sergt. Wm. J. Plaster, of Beaver Dam, and Private Fred W. Boyd, of Fredericton, Canadian Mounted Rifles, are reported officially as prisoners of war.

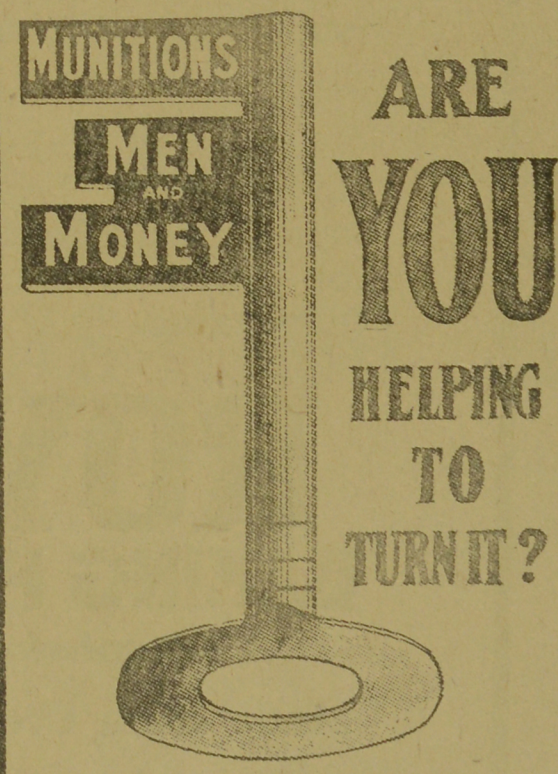
