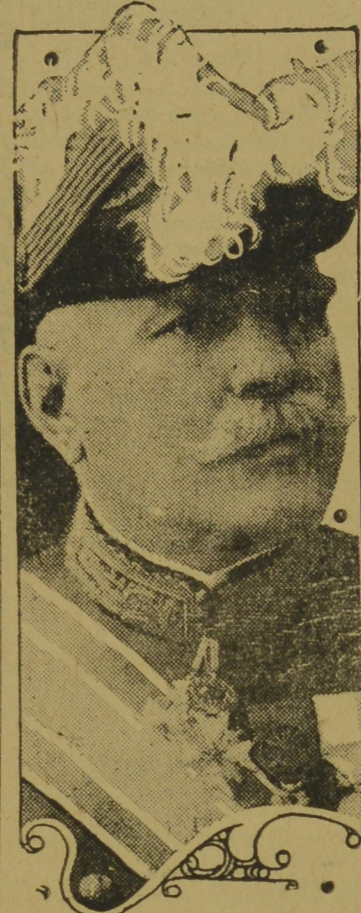

Paris, July 6.—In announcing the Russian success in Galicia to the French troops at Verdun on June 12, General Joffre issued the following order of the day:

"The plan ripened in the council of the coalition is now in full operation. Soldiers of Verdun, we owe it to your

heroic resistance, which has been an indispensable condition of success and the basis of our approaching victories, for it is that resistance which has created on the whole European war theatre a situation from which will emerge the final triumph of our cause."

## SIR EDWARD GREY FOR THE PEERAGE

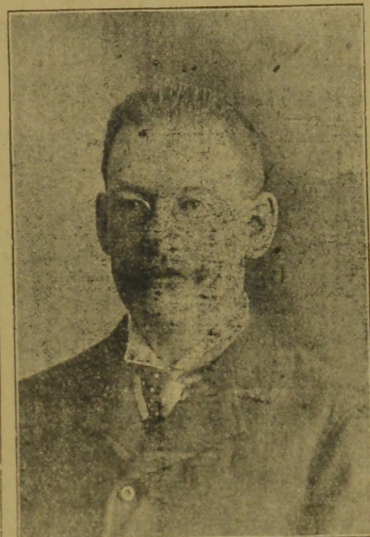

Coun. Sloat, chairman, Coun. Pat Graham and Coun. Clarkson.

Coun. Sloat said that the inspector had asked all councillors to inform him if liquor was being sold in their parishes. Personally he thought it would be wise to give such information.

Coun. Alex. Brewer wanted to know where the Kingswood Hotel was.

"The place is known by some of the councillors," replied the inspector, "and is commonly known as 'The Farm.'" (Laughter.)

Coun. Alex. Brewer said that the suggestion of the inspector was valuable. He had not handed out many plums to the inspector, but he would say that no official could do good work without public support.

### Municipal Home.

Coun. Neill reported verbally on the matter of a Municipal Home. He had conferred with the Mayor of Fredericton with regard to the matter, and from him had learned that home under the joint management of the three municipalities—York, Fredericton and Marysville—was favored. However, the city of Fredericton had a Municipal Home on its hands which must first be disposed of.

Mayor Mitchell thought that no action could be taken during the progress of the war, but that the city would join with the county when the time was ripe.

Coun. Neill said he felt that the people of the county were favorable to the proposition. The people of St. Councillor Allen of Marysville said that town strongly favored the establishment of a municipal home. The Town Council the night before had passed a resolution in favor of the proposition. Care of the poor had always been a grave problem in Marysville.

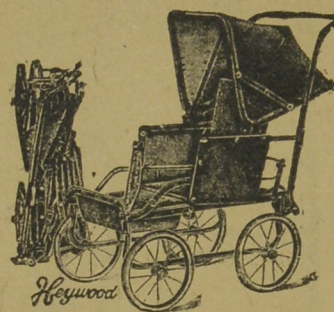
Coun. Alex. Brewer stated that care of the poor was becoming an increasing burden in almost all parishes. In the whole county the annual cost was about \$6,000. The time was coming when a central municipal home must be established. He also thought that a farm should be established in connection with the Home.

Coun. Brewer then proceeded to quote from a report prepared several years ago, by a special committee of the Municipal Council, which visited institutions in St. John and Kings counties.

Immediately before the Council adjourned at noon, Coun. Hunter read an address to the Warden, Coun. E. W. Stairs, of Southampton, and presented him with a handsome traveling bag as a token of esteem.

Warden Stairs responded in feeling manner, expressing his appreciation of the gift and the kindly feelings of the Councillors.

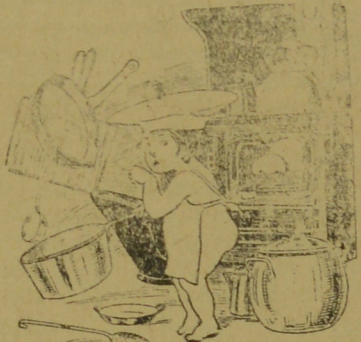

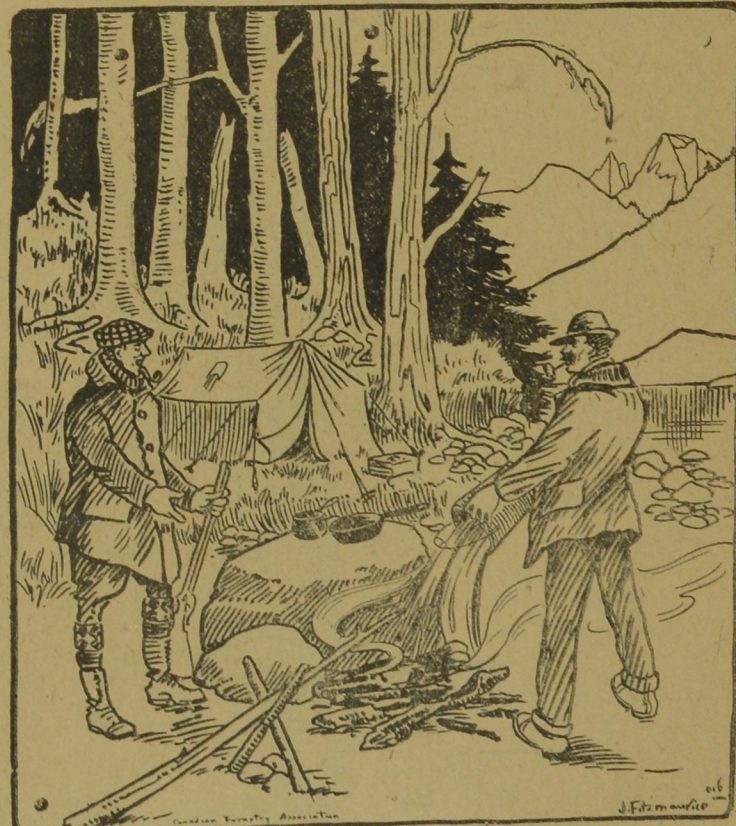
