Ottawa, Nov. 14.—A memorandum from the Post Office Department says: Information is still awaited from the British office in regard to sending parcels from Canada to prisoners of war in Germany, but in the meantime present arrangements for Canadian parcels should continue. Parcels to be delivered to prisoners of war in Germany before Christmas should be mailed at once, as they must leave Canada by steamer sailing this week.

## WORLD'S GREATEST BIBLE CLASS NOW GET TOGETHER 200,000 MEN

(Boston Record.)

Philadelphia, Nov. 13.—Has this city, cradle of the American Revolution, just given birth to another and greater revolution, a tremendous religious revival that will sweep America, embrace the whole of humanity and establish the Kingdom of God on earth?

If the brilliant religious events which I have just been watching mean what many Philadelphians claim they mean, then the above question is honestly put in rather a conservative way!

I have just been studying the astounding growth of the Stoneman Fellowship, which is nothing more nor less than the biggest men's Bible class in the world. It is a church club, founded by an Episcopalian minister, Dr. H. C. Stone, less than two years ago, and now actually having a membership rapidly approaching the 200,000 mark! Think of it!

#### Stoneman Fellowship.

Way back in the grammar grades we learned that the name Philadelphia meant "The City of Brotherly Love." I have just learned that the name not only means this, but the city actually is it!

Can it be more than a coincidence that the community established as the City of Brotherly Love has become the birthplace of an organization professing just such a Christian fellowship, and promising perhaps to win men throughout the world over to the church.

#### A Marvel, But a Fact.

The marvel of the Stoneman organization is the fact of it. Scores of other religious bodies profess the same sentiments of charity and Godliness as the Stonemen, who must therefore perforce use words that have been used in the same way before. But they can prove their essential difference by performing deeds that have not been done before. And they do.

Here are some of the things they do:

They can muster 100,000 members over night.

Five thousand of them paid their way to Pittsburgh and marched through the streets there just to stimulate the growth of the Stoneman Fellowship in that city.

For a similar purpose 10,000 Stonemen are about to invade New York, each man paying his own expenses; and the majority of them are men of

modest means.

#### Many Mechanics.

Thousands of them are mechanics and semi-skilled workers in Philadelphia's great industrial establishments. Cramps, the great shipbuilding concern, is a veritable beehive of Stonemen. Stonemen practically rule supreme in the Stetson hat factory. The Baldwin locomotive works is another stronghold of the organization.

And side by side with these workmen at the Stoneman meetings you will find some of the leading bankers, manufacturers, insurance men and merchants of Philadelphia. And each calls the other "brother."

Nobody asks these men to join. They must make application of their own free will. About 600 policemen are Stonemen.

Several hundred firemen have joined and there are about 400 sailors from Uncle Sam's navy yard at League Island, who have been initiated. Practically 75 per cent. of street railway employees are Stonemen. For a time initiations into the Fellowship averaged 3,000 every Sunday.

When 20,000 men assemble once a week to sing hymns, pray and hear sermons, they must be in dead earnest.

And the most startling fact of all is that these meetings are held on Saturday night. It is pay day. Poolrooms, saloons, theatres and picture shows are flaring their greatest attractions—yet these men assemble for hymns and prayer.

#### He Saved Others.

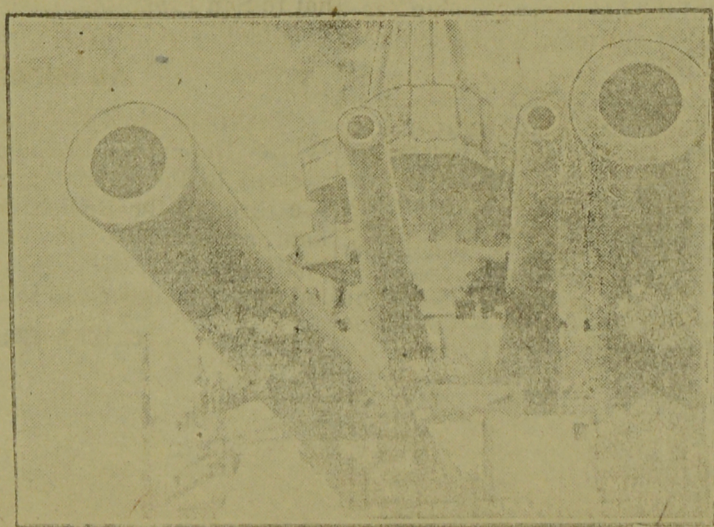
Now, what does the Stoneman Fellowship mean in the daily lives of its members?

The other day Frank Fredericks, a fireman, was with two companions fighting a fierce blaze on the roof of a small Philadelphia factory.

The roof started to collapse.

Fredericks was in a position to leap for safety. His companions were not. Fredericks was a Stoneman. He stepped aside, forced his two companions to make the jump to safety, and, saving them, fell to his death under the blazing roof.
