PRESS COMMENT ON SIR SAM'S RESIGNATION

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—The Ottawa Free Press, Liberal, says:

Sir Sam has many qualities that make for greatness, but he is lacking in one that is essential to political success, namely, balance. Up to a certain point Sir Sam proved that he was the very best kind of a man that Canada could have in the position of Minister of Militia in such a crisis. Beyond that point Sir Sam's personal weakness made his retention of that important office an irritation not only to his colleagues in the Government, but to the people at large. We don't hesitate to say that Sir Sam has been the victim of a campaign of vilification as unfair as it was cruel, but we must admit that it was Sir Sam himself who piled faggots on the fire that ultimately consumed him. Sir Sam Hughes was his own worst enemy, and the host of loyal friends he had won were unable to save him from the culminating effort of conduct and speech that was marked by a sheer disregard of the consequences.

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Your Life or Mine.
London, Nov. 14.—Commenting on the Hughes resignation this morning, the London Advertiser says:

Sir Sam Hughes has been thrown overboard by the Canadian Premier. Sir Robert Borden has dropped the pilot to whom he has sworn and exhibited undying allegiance. It is not wholly out of regard for the welfare of Canada that Sir Robert Borden does this thing. It has come to be with him, politically, a case of "Your life or mine."

The common sense of Sir Robert Borden must have long ago warned him that the Hughes parade and the Hughes buffoonery were not the proper attitudes for war time or any other time. The Hughes connection with Allison and the cashiering of Allison, discredited Sir Sam, but he was permitted to run the Militia Department

and to a large extent the country, despite his unfavorable record.

His Ross rifle attitude was not so much a reflection upon Sir Sam as upon the Premier, who permitted the concealment of the Alderson report long after it should have been made public, because it condemned the Ross rifle as a weapon unfit for Canadians on active service.

CANADIAN TROOPS IN SUCCESSFUL ATTACK

London, Nov. 14.—The following communique is issued by the Canadian War Records Office, London:

Just before midnight, Nov. 10-11, our troops attacked the remnant of the Regina trench which still remained in the enemy's hands. The distance of the objective from our trenches was about 500 yards.

The attack was completely successful soon after our first wave went over the parapet our barrage lifted from the enemy's trench and our men went into the trench with bombs and bayonets.

Within half an hour of the time of starting the whole position was in our hands.

The front taken extends in a semi-circle of about 1,000 yards.

This advance was accomplished with comparatively few casualties owing to the effectiveness of our curtain fire. Under cover of advanced bombing posts we consolidated the new line. The enemy counter attacked heavily from time to time throughout the night but was unable to shake our hold on the position.

The prisoners taken were less than a hundred, but included three officers. The troops opposed to us in this affair were Saxons and some units of the Prussian Guards.

BORDEN'S TRIBUTE TO THE LATE GOVERNOR

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—Among those mentioned for the succession of Lt. Governor McKeen of Nova Scotia are Geo. S. Campbell and M. C. Grant, of Halifax, and Senator McLennan, of Sydney.

Sir Robert Borden paid a tribute today to the dead Governor. "The late Lieut. Governor McKeen," he said, "was one of my most intimate personal friends and I received with the greatest regret and sorrow the tidings of his death. He had a career of more than thirty years in public life, and no man stood higher than he did in the esteem and affection of the people of his province. His last public words were uttered in an inspiring appeal which only a few days ago he issued to the people of Nova Scotia and in which he emphasized most forcibly and eloquently the duty of national service."

MARY PICKFORD HAS A NARROW ESCAPE

Movie Actors Trapped in a Sinking Sloop—Rescued by Fishermen From Chilly Waters.

Marblehead, Nov. 12.—The taking of a moving picture film, featuring Mary Pickford on the sloop Eddie Mott, back of Marblehead Neck, this afternoon, nearly resulted in a tragedy. The sloop, which was fast on the beach near Castle Rock, was pulled off at high tide this afternoon by two tugs preparatory to taking the last film.

On the sloop were Mary Pickford and her French maid; Maurice Tournier, the director; Matthew Moore; two camera men, John Vanderbrook, Louis Androit, and several young men from Marblehead who were to assist in navigating the vessel.

It was intended to sink the sloop so as just to cover the deck and give it buoyancy. A number of empty casks had been placed below deck, but they proved insufficient, and as soon as the sloop cleared the beach it began to sink rapidly. Before those on board realized their danger the bow went under and there was a wild scramble to the deckhouse. A number of fishermen's motorboats were in the vicinity and director Tournier called on them for aid.

Miss Pickford, who was caught in the cabin, was rescued by two men, who held her up in the cold waters until taken into the motor boat. Both men were standing in the water to their shoulders.

Miss Pickford escaped with a wetting to her knees, but some of the men had to swim until picked up. Hundreds of people witnessed the accident from the shore, but none realized at the time that it was a part of a prearranged programme.

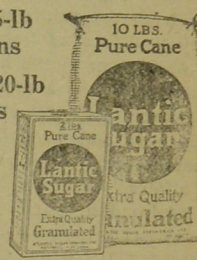

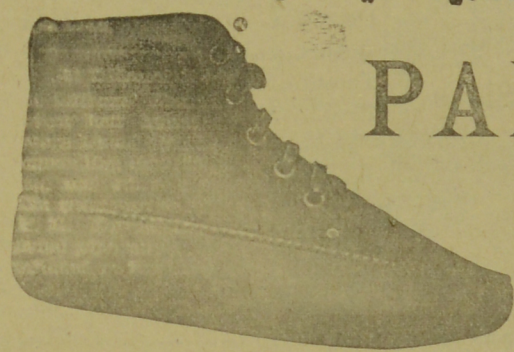

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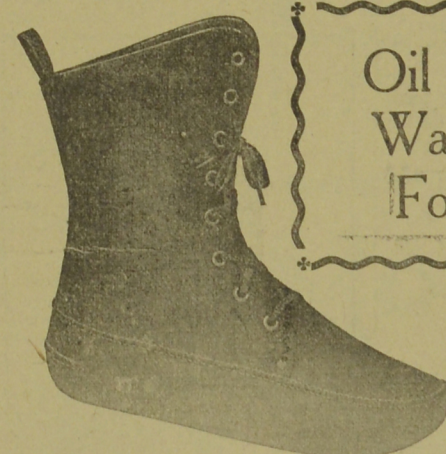
