The case of Gordon vs. Seime was also heard and judgment reserved. Judgment was delivered in the case of McIntosh vs. Porier, the motion being allowed with costs of appeal.

LOST RIGHT ARM

SCHOOL CHILDREN

HAD RAISED \$5,000

FOR BELGIAN FUND

Will be Discharged Shortly From the Hospital at Ramsgate, England--
Wife and Children to Join Him at Glasgow.

Final Returns Will Not be in for Some Weeks--Tag Day and Candy Sale in Fredericton Today.

Mrs. Joseph Roy, of this city, has received a letter from her husband, Private Joseph Roy, of the Royal Canadian Regiment, stating that he expected to be discharged from hospital at Ramsgate England, next week.

The letter contained a photograph of Private Roy taken in hospital, and showing the manner in which his body had healed after the amputation of his right arm. In addition to losing the limb Private Roy received two wounds in the back. His letters do not state how his wounds were received, but it is believed in an accidental explosion.

The disabled soldier is well known in Fredericton, having served here for several years with H Company, R. C. R. He left with that unit on the outbreak of the war, and served a year at Bermuda.

Later the R.C.R. were sent to France and Private Roy saw some hard service with his regiment.

Mrs. Roy expects to sail for Scotland with her children in the near future to join her husband. It is his intention to locate in Glasgow, his native city.

Lieut. Frank H. Tingley, of Moncton, is to be recommended as officer commanding a new artillery draft from New Brunswick. He is now in France. Mr. Tingley is a U. N. B. graduate and is well known in Fredericton.

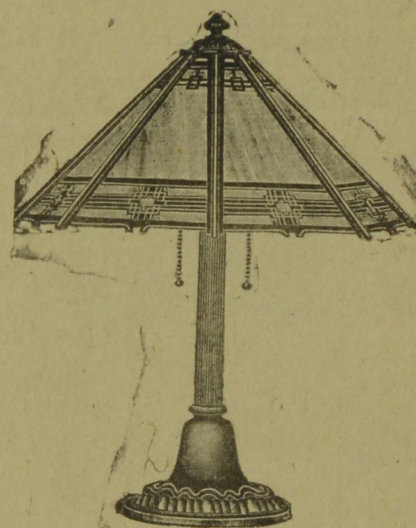
