WILL RAISE MORE MONEY FOR THE PATRIOTIC FUND

Resolution to Made up the Shortage of \$10,978 in the Patriotic Fund Adopted Unanimously at Public Meeting--Dr. T. C. Allen Shows How Fund is Being Expended.

The counties of York and Sunbury and the City of Fredericton are pledged to raise \$10,978.20 for the Patriotic Fund during the balance of the year. This amount will be divided as follows: Sunbury, \$988.04; York, \$5,489.10; Fredericton, \$4,501.06. It will be raised by assessment according to property valuation. The division is on the following basis: Sunbury, 9 per cent.; York, 50 per cent; Fredericton, 41 per cent.

This was decided yesterday afternoon at a meeting held in the City Council Chamber. The decision was unanimous. This money cannot be raised by assessment until next year, but the guarantee of payment then is all that is required by the Central Committee of the Patriotic Fund.

Yesterday's Proceedings.

His Worship Mayor Mitchell presided at yesterday's meeting. His Honor Judge Barry was the principal speaker delivering an excellent address of a patriotic nature, in which he referred to the fact that the meeting marked the second anniversary of the beginning of the war, and also to the needs of the Patriotic Fund. Dr. T. C. Allen presented a financial statement. The following resolution, prepared by His Honor the Lieut. Governor was passed unanimously:

"That on this, the second anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, this meeting of the citizens of Fredericton records its inflexible determination to continue to a victorious end the struggle in maintenance of those ideals of Liberty and Justice which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies."

All who spoke were in favor of assessing for the necessary amount for

the Patriotic Fund. Warden Stairs, Warden Patterson and Coun. D. W. Mersereau of Fredericton Junction all expressed themselves in favor of that course.

Facts Concerning Fund.

In the province of New Brunswick the sum of \$102,600 will be required by the Patriotic Fund during the remainder of 1916. The share of that amount which falls to the district served by the Fredericton Patriotic Committee is \$10,978.20. Up to July 31 the number of applications for assistance which had been received by the local Patriotic Committee was 434. On the same date the number of families receiving relief was 290. At the first of the year the number had been 195. The average monthly payment per family is \$15.50. The number of families, according to their place of residence, is as follows: Sunbury, 36; York, 109; Fredericton, 145. The number is constantly varying, but there is a steady increase.

CLAIMS A LOT FOR THE SCOT.

A Leader Wherever He Goes, and Especially in Free America.

Wherever the Scotchman goes, he becomes a leader. You hear of the Irish vote, the German vote, the Italian vote, but you hear only of Scottish leadership. He has had a powerful influence on our country.

Our first newspaper was published by a Scotchman, a Scot first won international honors for American letters; the steamboat, telephone, telegraph and electric light were devised by men of Scotch descent. The second college in our land was founded by a Scotch divine; our Constitution was framed and adopted largely by the influence of two Scotch lawyers; our most majestic orator, our most winning statesman, our greatest diplomatist, and our greatest poets were of Scotch lineage. So of many of our business captains and railroad magnates, almost one-half of our Presidents and a large proportion of our cabinet members, judges and governors. Was there ever such a drain of leadership upon a like area?

The Scotch have not alone helped make America. They control Australia, direct New Zealand, lead Canada and rule Africa. For centuries Scotland and Britain were bitter enemies, Edinburgh and Paris conspired against London. The union, when it finally came, was one of crowns and not of hearts. There still lurks jealousy under the surface. Write a letter to a loyal Glaswegian, address it "North Britain," and see what happens.
