## BRITAIN'S GREAT NAVY.

After all the tributes that had been paid to the vital service rendered the cause of the Allies by the British Navy, it remained for a Frenchman, M. Augagneur, Minister of War, to sum up in one short sentence the gist and the essential truth of many a lengthy article.

"It is the British fleet," said the French Minister of War—"it is the British fleet that saved the world from destruction by the barbarians of the twentieth century."

Speaking with equal sincerity and frankness, the Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, in the House of Commons the other day, enlarged upon the judgment of the French Minister, and added his tribute to the sailors and ships of Great Britain. "The British Navy," said Mr. Lemieux, "saved the Allies from speedy, irreparable disaster," and he pointed out in what manner disaster would have come.

"With superior Teutonic fleets, the French colonial empire, which is second only to the colonial empire of Great Britain, Tonquin, Madagascar, Annam, and other dependencies, would have been attacked and captured long ago; French and Russian shipping would have been swept away from the seas; French commerce would have been annihilated; France would have been cut off from Algeria, Morocco and Corsica, and all chance of obtaining munitions of war, food supplies and mechanical supplies from over the seas would have disappeared."

Experience, the course of events, the hard facts of current history—these are among our greatest teachers.

Canadians all have a greater appreciation of the British Navy that they had before the war broke out.

Before the public accounts committee at Ottawa on Wednesday it was brought out in evidence that the labels had been changed on samples of military clothing brought from the United States. A man named Nash, a tailor belonging to Morrisburg, was employed to do the job. He swore that he had not only changed the labels, but had raised the price of trousers from \$3.50 to \$4. He had been asked to do the work by Col. Morgan and to "keep his mouth shut." The witness' explanation as to why the change was made was as follows: "He (Col. Morgan) told me that as the garments came from the United States and were to be worn by Canadian troops, they were changing the labels so that the Germans could not complain about the United States supplying military clothing to Canada."

Moncton Transcript: "The Dominion is running an experimental farm at Fredericton. Last year the expenditures ran well over \$60,000, while the revenue was only \$2,000. Profitable farming! The details show that the expenses proper totaled \$50,278.23, and that \$10,701.56 additional were spent on new buildings, improvements, etc. The receipts for the year amounted to \$2,173.74. "The Dominion Government for this farm bought a wagon from a plumber and a stove from a fruit growing company. A specific item for pigs purchased appears, as well as pigs sold, but the total account savors pretty well of the Tory hog trough."

Mr. Andrew Broder, M. P. for Dundas, and Mr. David Henderson, M. P. for Halifax, have been sworn in as members of His Majesty's Privy Council. No doubt Senatorships would have been more acceptable to these veteran Conservative politicians, but they get the prefix "Honorable" and it is for life.

A by-election for the British Columbia Legislature, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Premier McBride, is being held in Victoria today. The candidates are Hon. Mr. Plummerfelt, Minister of Finance, and Mr. H. C. Brewster, leader of the opposition. The latter is a native of Albert County, New Brunswick.

It is stated that owing to the shortage of steel the return of the quill pen

to popular favor in Great Britain is predicted.

The bilingual clause of the Manitoba School Act was repealed by the Provincial Legislature this week by a vote of 36 to 8. Four cabinet ministers took part in the debate.
