TRAINING TO TAKE THE "LARD" OUT OF JESSE WILLARD

Heavyweight Champion
Getting Down to Work
In Central Park--McVea
May be for Training.

New York, March 2--Stung by a remark of a spectator that the greater part of Willard is lard, the heavyweight champion increased his routine today for his ten-round bout with Frank Moran March 25. In the morning he trotted four miles through the snow of Central Park and in the afternoon increased his workout, much to the satisfaction of a large crowd.

Advice from acknowledged critics of condition seemed to have the desired effect, for Willard really extended himself, acting for the first time as if he were serious. His gymnastic exercises and his sparring were done with spirit and he went through his entire workout at a speed warranted to reduce the amount of "lard in Willard."

Outside his brisk run, Willard boxed, meeting "Bob" Williams of six rounds instead of the usual Brooklyn, besides "Jack" Heppie and Walter Monahan.

William Muldoon, one-time wrestling champion, looked upon Willard for the first time today. He said that as a physical culturist, Willard has few equals and marvelled at the ease and grace of the 260-pound man. He said that Willard is in as good condition as any man can hope to be who has just started to train off the superfluous flesh accumulated through a year of idleness.

Permission was sought by "Sam" McVea to accept the deft of Willard, who has offered fifty dollars to any man who will floor him during his training period. Commissioner Wenck ruled that since "Jim" Coffey had been permitted to train when "Joe" Jeannette, there was no reason why Willard could not use McVea in the same way.

It was announced that application has been granted the Madison Square Garden management to crowd in an extra row of boxes for the bout because every one of the boxes has been sold and there is a demand for more.

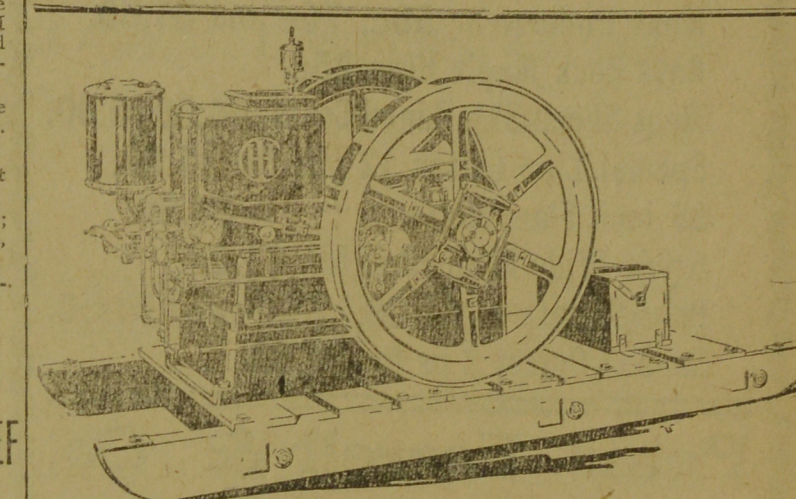
