## PRIVATE G. F. ROSSBOROUGH OF PRINCE WILLIAM ARRIVES

Wounded While Fighting With the 26th Battalion-- Home on Sick Leave.

A New Brunswick boy who returned home on the Sicilian, which arrived at St. John Friday, was Private G. F. Rossborough of Prince William, who has been wounded at the front, with the 26th Battalion, and sent home on sick leave. He was wounded severely in the famous crater fight which brought much glory to the boys of Col. McAvity's battalion.

"It is all the fight I want to be in for a while," he said, when speaking of the action.  
He was the only man in his section of the company making the charge who is still alive to tell the tale. The other members were either killed or died on account of their wounds after being brought in.

"The man who shot me was no more than ten feet away," said Private Rossborough. "I had reached the German parapet and was just raising my rifle to get this fellow when he fired first and got me right. I was standing sideways to him and the bullet tore its way across both my shoulders. I fell and was scrambling to my feet to put an end to the German when one of my comrades lying wounded on the ground managed to get his rifle to his shoulder and shot him dead."

Private Rossborough said that he had met Major Brown since he had returned to England and that he was looking fit.

## Malloy Liner Towed To New York
