METHODIST DISTRICT APPROVES OF WORK OF DOMINION ALLIANCE

Monument to be Placed on Grave of Rev. W. W. Brewer---Rev. W. H. Barraclough of St. John Addressed Meeting---October 1st to be Laymen's Sunday.

The financial meeting of the Fredericton District of the Methodist Church was held at Gibson on Thursday and Friday, Sept. 6th and 7th.

Those present were Rev. Thomas Marshall, chairman; Rev. H. Harrison, Secretary; Rev. Dr. Harrison, Rev. A. D. McLeod, Rev. J. J. Colter, Rev. F. A. M. Holmes, Rev. John B. Young, Rev. Geo. W. Tilley, Rev. D. H. Peters, Rev. B. W. Turner, Rev. A. Whiteside, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, Messrs. Upton, J. J. Weddall, C. A. Sampson, A. C. M. Lawson, J. Murray, G. E. McNab and Rev. W. H. Barraclough, St. John.

The meeting opened with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. J. J. Colter.

A careful examination was made of the financial standing of the different circuits and missions, and the amount of necessary grants was recommended to the mission board.

Communications were received from the Sunday school and mission departments of the church.

Mr. A. C. M. Lawson, president of the Conference Laymen's Association, presented the work of that society to the district.

Arrangements were completed for placing a monument at the grave of Rev. W. W. Brewer. The chairman, Rev. H. Harrison, and Mr. Geo. W. Dugas, were appointed a committee to see to the work being done.

Rev. W. H. Barraclough presented the claims of the Supernumerary Fund Augmentation Committee and by unanimous vote the district agreed to the necessary apportionment to insure the payment in full of the allowances to the supernumerary ministers and to ministers' widows.

Rev. B. W. Turner was appointed

district statistical secretary.

The chairman, Rev. A. D. McLeod, and Mr. J. J. Weddall were appointed to visit weak circuits and missions.

The chairman was instructed to send a letter of sympathy to Mrs. Wass on the death of Rev. Wm. Wass.

The following resolution was passed: "That the District expresses its appreciation of the visit of the Rev. Mr. Barraclough and its hope that his visit to the several districts will result in the complete success of the Supernumerary Fund."

The following resolution was also passed: "That this District heartily endorses the attitude and work of the N. B. Branch of the Dominion Alliance in relation to prohibition."

It was decided to hold the next District meeting in Stanley in November. The chairman and the Sunday school and social service secretaries were appointed a committee to arrange a programme for the day and for the two evening meetings.

The thanks of the District were presented to the friends at Gibson for the entertainment of the District.

It was recommended that the first Sunday in October be Laymen's Sunday, and the services as far as practicable be conducted on that day by laymen.

Arrangements were made for deputations to visit the several circuits in aid of the missionary, educational and temperance work of the church.

Rev. J. B. Young was appointed district secretary of the Epworth Leagues.

A public meeting was held on Thursday evening, when addresses were given by the chairman, Rev. T. Marshall, Rev. H. Harrison and Messrs. A. C. M. Lawson and C. A. Sampson.

BRISK DEMANDS FOR AROOSTOOK POTATOES

Price Recently Ran up to \$2.74 Per Barrel---Car Shortage at Some Points.

If ever anything was in demand, potatoes are in demand in Aroostook this fall, says the Fort Fairfield Review. The price shows it plainly enough. The railroad strike having cleared off all right, buying began in earnest again Saturday and continued on Monday.

On Monday \$2.50 a barrel was a common price, while the figures on one load ran up to \$2.74. How is that September 4th? Its equal was never before known. The price on Tuesday was \$2.30 to \$2.45 in the forenoon, mostly on account of the shortage of cars. The car shortage is not felt very badly at the competing points, but is pretty severe at the small sidings.

Aroostook's stock was never finer, cleaner, brighter or more satisfactory than now. There is no rot whatever, very little scab, and the quality in general is just right for table use. Many extra good yields are reported, while of course medium ones are more nearly the rule. Many fields, however, show pretty light, owing to shortage of fertilizer, poor cultivation or something of the kind.

At the going prices, of course, a big part of the crop will be sold from the fields, but no one need fear that a lot of it will not be stored. There will be potatoes enough in Aroostook to go all the winter and spring, no matter what the price is; that is, they will not all be sold until late in the spring, as usual.

A HOT CAMPAIGN IN CARLETON COUNTY

Opposition Forces Putting up a Splendid Fight Against the Grafters' Brigade.

Centreville, Sept. 8.—The answer to Hon. James A. Murray's tirade of abuse of the opposition workers and speakers at Richmond Corner last night was given by E. S. Carter in his speech at a splendid meeting here tonight. The Minister of Agriculture was answered in detail and such a volume of proof was produced from the official records as to show the patriotic and Belgian potato transaction up in its true light. The part B. Frank Smith played in this outrageous transaction was shown in detail and the evasions of Minister Murray in the Legislature, his denials of facts, his contradictions, were all plainly set forth.

The candidates, Messrs. McCain and Upham, were given a splendid reception, and P. J. Veniot, in a comprehensive and telling speech, showed how press, particularly the statement of the two representatives who are here following the campaign, and who telegraphed their newspapers that H. M. Blair, former Deputy Minister of Public Works, had spoken in the Opposition interest at Newburgh and at Northampton, while as a matter of fact Mr. Blair has not spoken at any Opposition meeting, nor has he been asked to speak. The falsehoods of the Government press, the violence of their headlines, and the words placed in the mouths of the members of the Government are causing amazement and disgust among their own supporters.

It will be remembered how desperate a campaign the Government newspapers conducted in the Westmorland by-election, and their prediction of 1,000 majority up to polling day. Their predictions regarding Carleton county are equally misleading and untruthful. If political passion does not prevent a sober consideration of public affairs, the verdict of Carleton county will be like that of Westmorland.

Death Followed Injury.

Howard Allen, formerly of this city, died in Hartford, Conn., yesterday as the result of injuries received some days ago. The deceased was a structural steel worker and fell from a building, alighting upon a pavement. He left Fredericton some 17 years ago. He is survived by a widow and one son, residing in Hartford, also by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Allen, of Phoenix Square, this city, and a number of brothers and sisters living in Fredericton and vicinity. Interment will be made at Hartford.
