THE RUSSIANS NOW OCCUPY ALL OF TURKISH ARMENIA

**Best Troops of the Ottoman Empire Put
To Rout by the Russian Bear---Germans
Withdraw Troops From the Balkans to
Defend the Galician Frontier.**

Petrograd, via London, July 27.—Russian troops covered 100 miles in their advance on Erzincan within a week. The capture of that city means the virtual completion of the Russian occupation of Turkish Armenia, and gives Russia the benefit of the extremely fertile valley and opens an easy means of communication to Trebizond for the western and southern Caucasus armies.

It is estimated that the Turks had between 25 and 30 divisions between the Black Sea and Mush—approximately 350,000 men. Three months ago the Turks undertook a comprehensive campaign, intended to recapture Erzerum and incidentally to draw troops from the Russian European theatre.

General Eudenich, the Russian commander in the Caucasus, succeeded, however, in holding the Turks in the Erzerum district while delivering an effective blow at them in the Mush district. In order to counter this flanking movement from the south and a similar effort from the north, the Russians were obliged temporarily to abandon Mamakhaton, 50 miles west of Erzerum.

The Russians now have captured Trebizond, Balbart and Gumish Khaneh, and re-occupied Mamakhaton.

Blocked in Other Direction.

The Galician advance of the Russians has caused the Germans to withdraw troops from the Balkans, and Turks were sent there to replace them. The Russians, quick to see the advantage thus afforded, started a vigorous offensive toward Erzincan.

Only a rear guard battle preceded the capture of the town, the Turkish

main forces having been beaten and forced to retreat toward Sivas.

Colonel Thumsky, military critic of the Bourse Gazette, in an article on the victory of the Russians at Erzincan, says:

This defeat of the best troops of the Ottoman Empire has quite broken the Turkish defence. No further serious offensive can be expected, since only parts of a division from the Constantinople, Thracian and Egyptian armies can be spared to patch up these broken units."

The End Not Near.

Discussing the energetic preparations of the Russians for the continuance of the war, General Chouvaieff, Minister of War, in an interview with the Russky Slovo, says:

"It is necessary to dispel the illusion that the war can end in the autumn. The breaking down of the enemy's forces has already begun—a fact as well known to the Germans as to the Entente Allies—but Germany's technique is so high that in spite of her economic weakening and the lowered morale of her troops, Germany still has the power to resist, and we must look forward to a further struggle before the final victory."

"This explains the recent orders calling men, ordinarily exempt, to the colors. Russia already has a large reserve, but it is our intention that this reserve shall not diminish. It is fitting also that the foreign races in Russia, who ordinarily would not be obliged to serve, should be recruited, if not in the active army, at least in work connected with the conduct of the war, for all elements in Russia will receive the benefits of victory."

BRANCH OF BRITISH SAILOR'S RELIEF FUND

Organization Completed Here Last
Evening by Mr. M. P. Fennell
of Montreal.

A local branch of the British Sailors' Relief Fund was formed in Fredericton yesterday afternoon. Officers of the association are as follows:

Honorary President, Archibald Fraser.
President—Lieut. Col. T. G. Loggie.
Vice-President—J. T. Jennings.
Secretary—Rev. Dr. D. W. Roberts.
Treasurer—W. S. Thomas.
His Worship Mayor Mitchell presided at the meeting, which was held in the City Council chamber. R. H. Simonds acted as secretary.

The Worship made a brief opening address, introducing Mr. M. P. Fennell of Montreal, secretary of the Harbor Commission of that port, who is the honorary secretary of the Sailors' Relief Fund in Canada and who has been given two months leave of absence to organize the Fund throughout Canada.

In New Brunswick he has organized branches in Moncton, St. John and Fredericton.

Mr. Fennell addressed the meeting, placing before it the claims of the dependants of the men of the Royal Navy and the mercantile marine who had lost their lives in the great war. This also was to raise \$500,000 in Canada for the fund and give it to H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught on his departure for England in October.

Montreal had raised \$75,000 in one week for the fund. Nova Scotia had pledged \$25,000 and Prince Edward Island had offered her share.

Mr. Fennell was followed by Rev. Dr. Roberts, Mr. J. D. Palmer and Mr. J. J. Weddall, all of whom made short addresses. The work of organization was then completed.

The Fredericton Branch is to undertake the work of organizing another branch at Woodstock with assistance from the headquarters of the Fund at Montreal. Mr. Fennell thought the Fredericton branch could cover all the western part of the province, but others stated that Woodstock probably would prefer to act independently.

SIR PIERRE A. LANDRY

Counsel by the Governor General.

He was first elected to the New Brunswick Legislature in 1870, was defeated in 1874, re-elected in 1878 and 1882. In 1878, on the reorganization of the ministry, he was appointed Chief Commissioner of Public Works, being the first Acadian to be honored with a portfolio. When the late Hon. D. L. Hanington became Premier in 1882 Mr. Landry accepted the portfolio of Provincial Secretary, and held office until the ministry resigned the following year after being defeated on a vote of want of confidence in the Legislature.

Hon. Mr. Landry was elected to the House of Commons for Kent in 1883, and continued to represent that constituency until 1890, when he was appointed County Court Judge for Westmorland and Kent. In 1893 he was elevated to the Supreme Court bench, being the first Roman Catholic to be appointed to that body. When the court was reorganized a few years ago he was appointed Chief Justice of the trial or King's Bench division.

The honor of knighthood was conferred upon him by His Majesty King George in May of this year.

The late Sir P. A. Landry took a warm interest in St. Joseph's College and had been a member of the board of governors for many years. In 1900 the University of New Brunswick conferred upon him the degree of LL.D., and a similar honor was given him by Laval two years later.

The deceased was for some time a member of the law faculty of Ottawa University. For years he was prominent in L'Assomption and other French Canadian societies.

The deceased married Miss McCarthy, daughter of the late Mr. Timothy McCarthy of Fredericton, in 1872. A family of six sons and one daughter survive. They are Pierre A. Landry, in France with the 3rd Pioneer Corps; Hector L., barrister, of Edmonton; Dr. Raymond Landry, of Moncton; John, also in Edmonton; William, in France with the 23rd Battery, and Allan and Miss Marie, at home, survive.

Mr. N. A. Landry, of Bathurst, is a brother, and Mr. John A. McCarthy, of Fredericton, a brother-in-law of the deceased.

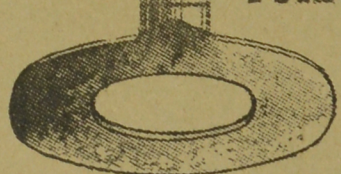
