BRITISH STEAMERS
ESCAPE FROM HUNS

Stockholm, via London, July 27.—Almost every day British steamers lying at Russian ports manage to get out of the Baltic and escape the German cruisers. The ships generally cross the Gulf of Bothnia and are piloted around Sweden inside the territorial limit.

This traffic during the last few weeks has been considerably developed. The ships as a rule take on board an entire Swedish crew and Swedish officers. The pro-German papers here are urging that this traffic be stopped, contending that it is not in accord with absolute neutrality; but the government has taken on action so far against it.

EXECUTION OF CASEMENT
MAY BE PRIVATE

London, July 27.—Justice Darling said he had received a letter from those representing Casement, and calling the Crown Attorneys into court. He made the foregoing announcement after conferring with Justices Bray and Scrutton, the only appeal judges present in court.

Justice Darling added that the King's coroner had been told by those representing Casement that it was desired to make application to the Court of Criminal Appeal, but he had heard from another source that it was improbable the application would be made as the matter was uncertain, and they could not allow any uncertainty in a question of this kind. The court, he said, would sit tomorrow to hear any application Casement's attorneys might wish to make.

The London News Agency says that a public execution of Roger Casement is highly improbable, and that falling special instructions from the government, arrangements to hold it in privacy at the Petonville prison on Aug. 4 will be proceeded with.

In any case, the news agency says, a public execution would probably mean that reporters only would be admitted as representing the general public. According to some authorities, executions for crimes except those of murder, must be public.

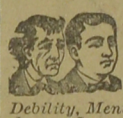

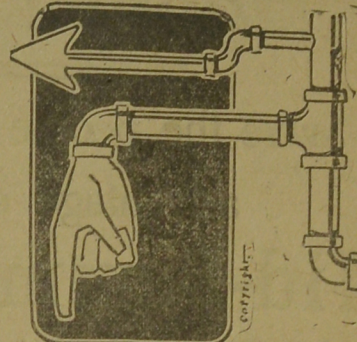

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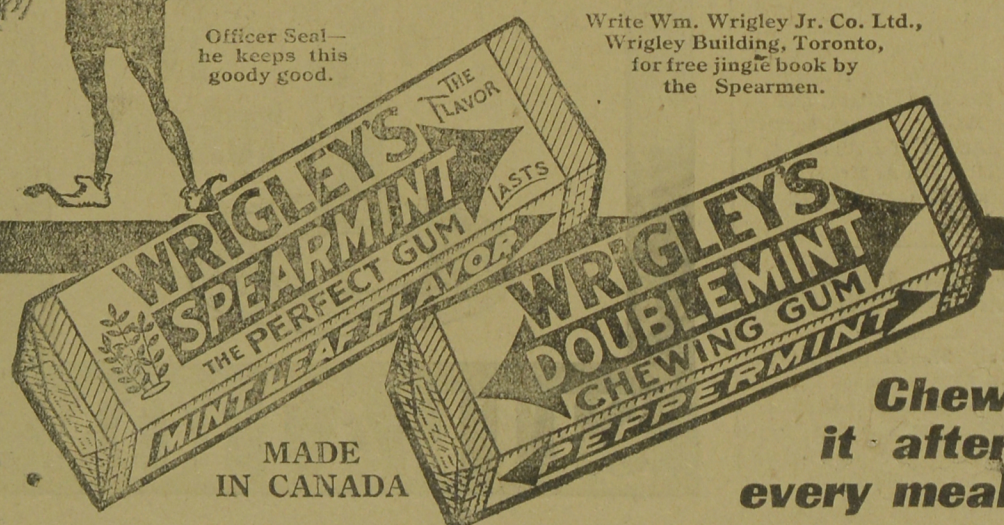
