### GERMAN PAPER SUPPRESSED FOR PLAIN TALK

#### Says Declaration That Germany Was Forced Into the War Cannot be Supported.

London, Aug. 8.—According to the Daily Express, the following represents a translation of the part of the article for which the Berliner Tageblatt was suppressed:

"The declaration that this war was inevitable, and that Germany was forced into it unprepared and against her will, cannot be supported except by the most extreme partisans. Undoubtedly the conflict could have been avoided had the government desired to avoid it, and doubtless it would have been had the Reichstag been taken into the confidence of our rulers instead of merely being presented with a recital of actions taken independently of parliament.

"The proposal for a conference put forward by Sir Edward Grey was rejected before members of the Reichstag had an opportunity of hearing the proposal, and the Imperial Chancellor's statement with regard to the 'regrettable necessity' of violating the neutrality of Belgium was also made after the event.

### ISSUES WARNING TO NEUTRAL NATIONS

Rotterdam, Aug. 8.—The Berlin correspondent of the Cologne Volks Zeitung, writes as follows:

"It cannot be denied that England, by setting aside the rights of neutrals, is drawing closer the cord around the Central Powers. It will become a doubtful case for us if we are not able to confirm and extend our victory by military means.

"Signs of this are the appointment of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg as supreme commander in the east, and the increased activity of the submarines and Zeppelins on the English coast."

The writer concludes with this threat to neutrals:

"There has as yet been no determined resistance by neutrals against the restrictions which oppress them so heavily in an economic sense. Will they know now how to draw direct conclusions from the situation and the determination of the Central Powers.

"We refrain from giving an answer to this question. It is for them to make it known speedily and clearly, for our measures of defence cannot halt before a neutrality behind which our opponents attempt to carry out their war of exhaustion."

### STRENGTHEN RELATIONS WITH PERSIA

Petrograd, Aug. 7, via London, Aug. 8.—Great Britain and Russia have just concluded an understanding with Persia, strengthening the friendly relations between the three countries, according to a despatch to the semi-official.

"The ministers of Russia, Great Britain and Persia," says the correspondent, "yesterday exchanged notes bringing to a conclusion negotiations which had been in progress between the three countries, creating an entente which definitely strengthens the friendly relations between England, Russia and Persia."

"A solution mutually favorable to all the parties has been found for questions relating to the financial and military organization of Persia."

### A BIG INCREASE IN PARALYSIS EPIDEMIC

New York, Aug. 8.—The intense heat and humidity wave which has gripped New York is coincident with another big increase in the epidemic of infantile paralysis. Only once since the plague got its start six weeks ago were there more deaths and new cases than reported in today's health department bulletin. During the 24-hour period ending at 10 a. m., 53 children died of the disease in the greater city, and 183 new cases were reported.

Since the epidemic began on June 26 there have been 5,347 cases and 1,196 deaths.

### BRITISH STEAMER TRIDENT BELIEVED TO BE SUNK

London, Aug. 8.—The British steamship Trident, of 3,129 tons gross, is believed to have been sunk, according to an announcement made at Lloyd's shipping agency today.

The Trident was 325 feet long, 45 feet beam and 23 feet deep. She was built at Stockton in 1902. Newcastle, Eng., was her home port.
