## Had Photograph Taken.

Five colored men who have enlisted here for No. 2 Construction Corps, were photographed yesterday. These are the first recruits secured in New Brunswick for this corps, and the photograph will be used for recruiting purposes. It is said that the St. John Brass Band, a musical organization of colored men which was heard at the last Fredericton Exhibition, will enlist in a body.

## Capt. Read Returns Home.

Capt. J. A. Read, who recently gave up command of the tern schooner Melba at Halifax, arrived home by last evening's train. There is a keen demand for sea captains at the present time and since leaving the Melba Captain Read has had two offers, but he declined them. He has been following the sea for fifty-five years and has made up his mind to quit for good. Capt. Read took charge of the Melba in July last year, and proceeded to the Canary Islands with a load of lumber. During the winter months he sailed between Gulf ports and the Island of Cuba.

## Had Trouble With Police.

Two young men who are said to reside at Lake George, but who have been haying near the city, attempted to "paint the town red" last night. The attempt proved unsuccessful, and they spent the night in the cells at the police station. One pleaded not guilty this morning to charges of being drunk and using profane language and resisting the police. He was convicted, however. The other pleaded guilty to charges of being drunk and interfering with the police. The younger was fined an aggregate of \$38 on three charges and the other a total of \$22 on two charges. I. O. O. F. FORMALLY  
OPENED TODAY

Mayor Mitchell Delivered Address of  
Welcome-- Past Grand Master  
White of Ontario Among Those  
Who Spoke.

The Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland opened its session here this morning in the drill hall of the Normal School Annex. The session was devoted principally to the routine work necessary in opening the lodge. At noon an open session was held, at which His Worship Mayor Mitchell tendered the visitors a welcome on behalf of the City of Fredericton, and other addresses were delivered.

The Rebekah Assembly completed its session this morning with the installation of officers.

## The Grand Lodge.

When the public session of Grand Lodge opened this morning, Grand Master W. B. Belyea, of Woodstock, presiding, it was announced that a special committee with Mayor Mitchell was waiting without. The special committee, composed of Mr. W. S. Hooper, P. G. M., and Mr. C. A. Sampson, P. G. M., then escorted His Worship to the seat of honor on the Grand Master's right.

His Worship then delivered a brief speech of welcome, to which Grand Master Belyea replied.

Mrs. Pollard, president of the Grand Assembly, Daughters of Rebekah, was called upon and addressed the Assembly, dwelling particularly upon the benefits derived from the order.

"LAURIE" SHERMAN  
DIED OF WOUNDS  
RECEIVED IN FRANCE

Native of Fredericton--Left Service of  
Royal Bank in London and En-  
listed in Ranks of Royal  
Sussex Regt.

Lance Corp. Lawrence S. Sherman, a native of Fredericton, has died in England of wounds received while serving in France with the Royal Sussex Regiment.

Rev. L. Ralph Sherman, curate of Trinity Church, St. John, and brother of the deceased, received a cable yesterday informing him of the sad tidings. This morning he telegraphed the news to friends of the family in this city.

The deceased is survived by two brothers and three sisters, Lt. Frank Sherman, Canadian Pay Office, London, Eng.; Rev. L. R. Sherman, curate of Trinity Church, St. John; Miss Stella Sherman, of Barrington N. S.; Miss Myra Sherman, of this city, and Mrs. Dugald Burpee, of Pendleton, B. C.

The late Lance Corp. Sherman entered the service of the Royal Bank of Canada as a clerk in this city, leaving Fredericton High School to do so. He was steadily advanced in this service in spite of ill health which necessitated an operation several years ago.

In the summer of 1914, shortly before the war broke out, he was transferred to the bank's branch in London, England. Last autumn he enlisted in the Royal Sussex Regiment and served with one of its battalions in France.

In the recent heavy fighting he received the wounds which resulted in his death. The word of his death came as a severe shock, as previous tidings were that he had come through the "big drive" all right.
