

## IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS CONCERNING THE DAILY MAIL

Beginning on Monday, January 3rd, Fredericton will have an evening paper which will be sold for the low price of one cent. The paper which is thus to be placed within the reach of all, it is needless to say, is The Daily Mail. It will be on sale each evening in the city, Marysville, Gibson and St. Marys, and one cent buys a copy.

The subscription price of the Mail, delivered by carriers, is now four dollars per year. Beginning with the New Year it will be three dollars a year. Present subscribers who have paid in advance for their paper can renew their subscriptions at the reduced figure. The price for the paper sent by mail to any point in Canada will be two dollars per year, payable in advance.

It requires some courage to cut the price of a newspaper at a time like this, but the publishers of The Daily Mail have an abiding faith in Fredericton, and believe that their action will meet with the hearty approval of the public. The Mail has during the past week installed modern machinery at a cost of thousands of dollars. Arrangements have been made for a telegraphic service equal to that carried by the St. John evening papers. We propose to publish a first class up-to-date live local paper, and as such appeal with confidence for the support of the people of this community.

In politics The Mail will be independent. This does not necessarily mean that it will wink at or condone wrongdoing on the part of public men and public officials, but it means that this paper will not be a political hack organ in any sense of the term. Rascals in office and rascals out of office need expect no quarter from this journal. Its friends and patrons in the county of York are not confined to one political party. Decent Conservatives and decent Liberals, who put the interests of the country first, can always count on a square deal from The Mail. Their interests are our interests, and always will be.

The Mail proposes to stand up for the best interests of the city of Fredericton first, last and all the time. The need of a fearless and independent paper in this city was never greater than at the present moment. The Empire is at war. All classes of people are making sacrifices, and like a thief at night comes the announcement that the Federal Government operation of the St. John Valley Railway is to cease. So long as there is a shot in the locker, The Mail will fight this monstrous proposal, and it will not hesitate to denounce the weak-kneed politicians who would permit such a cruel wrong to be perpetrated on the people of the oldest settled portion of this province.

The Mail has always had a generous support from the business men of Fredericton, and with its greatly improved facilities it looks for a still more generous support in the future.

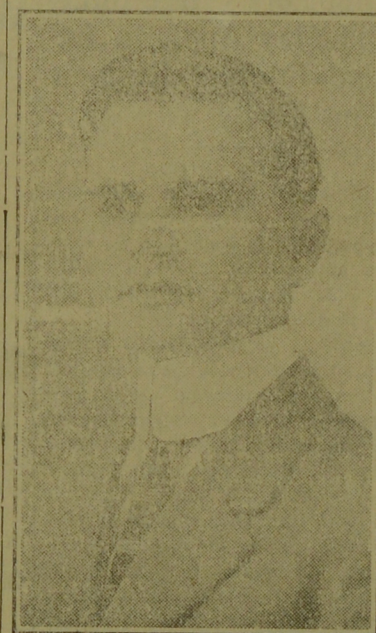

### U. N. B. RHODES SCHOLAR HAS BRILLIANT CAREER

Murray Mc Baird is a Splendid Scholar And Belongs to a Clever Family

Murray McC. Baird, who, it has been announced in the Mail, is the Rhodes scholar this year from U. N. B., is a son of H. P. Baird, of Fredericton. He is a member of the senior class and was elected out of four candidates. The new Rhodes scholar is a native of Salmon Creek, Queens county.

With his family he removed to Fredericton in 1905 and since that time attended the public schools of the city, Fredericton High School and the University of New Brunswick. He gave evidences of an excellent scholarship while at High School, among other honors winning the prize for highest general standing on graduation. At the University of New Brunswick he also distinguished himself. During his course he won the William Crockett memorial prize, the Wilmot scholarship and the alumni gold medal.

In addition to showing the marks of a good student, he has been prominent in various branches of college activities. He played forward on the Rugby team of 1915 and in 1914 was substitute on the team which won the intercollegiate championship. He also was a member of the debating team last year. He is an editor of the University Monthly and is prominent in Y. M. C. A. work. Mr. Baird is being warmly congratulated. He will take up residence at Oxford next September.

Mr. Albert C. Baird, a brother, led the U. N. B. class last year and is now professor of physics in the Kansas State Agricultural College. His sister, Edna, was studying music in Germany.

many at the outbreak of the war, but managed to get out of the country.

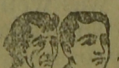
Another sister, Miss Verna Baird, holds a superior school license and is a teacher at the Morrison Mill school.

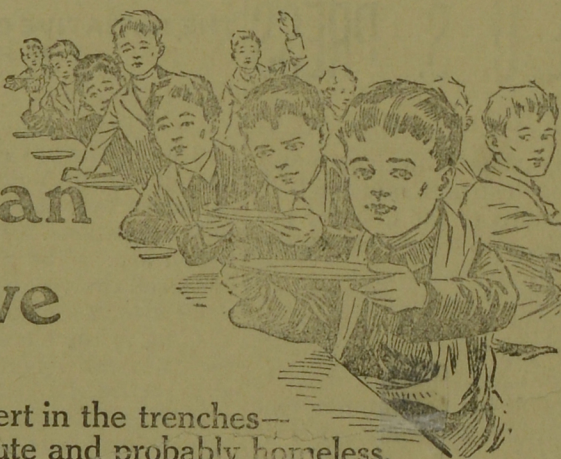

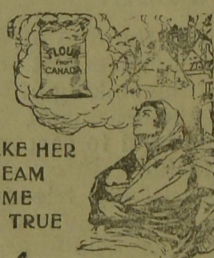
