LOSS OF LIFE ON THE STEAMER PERSIA NOW THOUGHT TO BE IN EXCESS OF 200


LONDON, Jan. 3.—The loss of life in connection with the sinking of the British steamship Persia, torpedoed in the eastern Mediterranean on Thursday, is still a matter of doubt.

Latest advices from Cairo and Alexandria indicate that 158 survivors have been landed, of whom 59 were passengers Hope that others have been saved is diminishing, as four days have now elapsed since the vessel was destroyed. No further word has been received concerning Robert N. McNeely, American consul at Aden, Arabia, and there seems to be little doubt that he was drowned. The fate of Charles Grant, of Boston, being established, it is thought Mr. McNeely was the only American who perished. It is still impossible to give even with approximate accuracy the loss of life, as the number of persons on board has not been established. The passengers numbered something more than 200, and there were between 200 and 300 members of the crew, so that apparently the death list will run largely in excess of two hundred.


