



OF BASEBALL IS DEAD

Montreal, Dec. 31—"Tip" O'Neill, famous old time baseball player, died suddenly of heart disease on a street car here today.

## WAD THE ORIGINAL "TIP."

Chicago, Dec. 31—"Tip" O'Neill, who died suddenly at Montreal today was a member of the famous St. Louis Browns' outfield of Welch, McCarthy and O'Neill. He was the original "Tip." He joined the St. Louis Browns as a pitcher under Charles A. Comiskey, now owner of the Chicago White Sox. President Comiskey said O'Neill was a wonderful ball player in his day and was a great batter and had lots of speed. He retired from baseball in 1894. He was about fifty eight years old.

JIM CORBETT INJURED  
IN AUTOMOBILE SMASH

New York, Dec. 30—Turning his limousine into a lamp post to avoid crashing into a heavy truck, James J. Corbett, formerly champion heavy weight pugilist, living in Bayside, L. I., was injured and his wife severely cut about the head at Freeman and Redde streets, Long Island City, at 6.30 this evening.

Mr. Corbett was bruised about the body and Mrs. Corbett suffered a scalp wound, which later was treated by Dr. W. S. Burns of Astoria.


## HALF OF THE PLEASURE.


