The matter of incorportating the town of Hartland has again come to the fore, according to reports received from that part of the province.



If I do say it that shouldn't, I have just as much brains as the average doctor. 'I strive to give my customers the benefit of my knowledge, my artistic skill and judgement and my ideas on publicity. "When some people around here have a little printing to be done, they visit all the printing offices, get quotations from each one, and then give the work to the man who gives the lowest figures.
