ASHBURNHAM CLUB DOING GOOD WORK

Has Endowed a Bed in the Princess
Patricia's Hospital at Ramsgate, England.

Dear Sir:—

I am glad to be able to announce that with the assistance of Lieut. Colonel Noel G. L. Marshall, the bed subscribed for by the members of the Ashburnham Club has now been placed in Her Royal Highness the Princess Patricia Hospital, Ramsgate, England. The bed will be named "The Ashburnham Club Bed. Donated in memory of the Fredericton Heroes, who have fallen in the War."

I may state that the bed is fully equipped with every necessary, and provision for the upkeep of linen, etc., has been made for the duration of the war, or until the bed is no longer Wounded Soldiers and Sailors

The Ashburnham Club is now merged in the Ashburnham Branch of the Red Cross Society, and this is the only true Red Cross Branch in the City. Up to a very short time ago, Fredericton was the only town in Canada without a Branch of the World-Wide Red Cross Society, and the Ashburnham Branch having received its Charter from Headquarters, is the only body in Fredericton, and the County of York, legally entitled to the use of the Geneva Cross as its emblem.

BRITISH TROOPS ACHIEVING SUCCESS

London 17.—Andrew Bonar Law, member of the British war council, moving in the House of Commons this afternoon the second reading of the Bill to extend the life of parliament until the end of November said the British troops were engaged in the greatest operations since the commencement of the war and were meeting with success which exceeded his expectations. It would be highly disadvantageous, Mr. Bonar Law said, if the country should be plunged into the turmoil of an election with the possibility of a division and certainly the energies of the nation would be diverted from the prosecution of the war.

At a meeting of the Irish nationalist party it was decided to oppose the bill for the extension of the life of parliament.

WESTERN FARMERS ARE GREATLY PLEASED

Order-in-Council Removing Duty From
Wheat and Flour in Effect.

Ottawa, April 17.—Personal messages to the government and statements from officials of the Grain Growers' Association today indicate that the removal of the wheat duty has immensely pleased the western farmer. The order-in-council goes into effect today. The government's decision was made the easier by the entry of the United States into the war, removing the objection to the creating of a channel for Canada wheat to a neutral country. It is indicated here today that the matter will be brought up in parliament by the opposition in effort to have free wheat continued after the war, as the order-in-council has been put through under the War Measures Act, and presumably might cease to be effective after the conclusion of peace.

Much Wheat in Bond.
Washington, April 17.—Great quantities of Canadian wheat, now in bond in the United States and subjected to duties of ten cents a bushel, have been made duty free by the Canadian government's actions in placing wheat, wheat flour and semolina on the Canadian free list.

By the same act Canada has removed the duty on American wheat flour, and this in turn removes the duty on Canadian wheat flour coming into the United States. This is in accordance with the terms of the tariff law which provided that whenever any country imposing duties on American wheat, wheat flour or semolina, removes such duties, the American duties on those products from such country shall likewise be removed.

Ice Still Holding.
The ice in the St. John river at this point still holds on the piers of the two bridges. The river rose six inches last night and is rising today. No change in the condition of the ice is reported from above or below the city.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT MEETING HERE TODAY

Will Hear an Application for a Grant
To the Fredericton
Exhibition.

A meeting of the Provincial Government with all the members in attendance, was held last evening, and another this morning, but the business transacted was mostly of a routine nature. It is expected that the members of the executive will remain here until Friday.

The members of the executive holding portfolios will be at their homes on Monday, as nominations for the by-elections take place on that date. So far, no opposition to any of the ministers has developed and the latter are not losing any sleep over the matter.

Tomorrow a delegation from the Fredericton Agricultural Society will meet the executive and ask for a substantial grant in aid of the exhibition which it is proposed to hold here next September.

Delegations representing steamboat companies operating on the St. John river and tributaries will meet the executive and make application for subsidies.

Allies Can Re- cruit in U. S.

Washington, April 18.—The bill permitting the Allies to recruit their citizens in the United States, was passed today by the Senate by unanimous consent and went to the House to wait action there.

ILLINOIS SALOONS PUT OUT OF BUSINESS

Chicago, April 18.—Figures compiled today by the Anti-Saloon League show that 141 saloons were voted out of business in elections in various cities and towns of Illinois. The "drys" won in fourteen "wet" cities and towns, but lost three dry towns.

Work During Year.

During the year the Central Committee carried on its work at Fredericton in rooms in the Parliament Buildings which were placed at the disposal of the committee. Seven sewing machines are part of the equipment which is used to provide clothing and comforts for the soldiers.

Since the beginning of the war the committee has shipped 11,504 pairs of socks. During the past year part of the shipments of socks went to East Africa. Other goods to the value of \$5,000 have been shipped during the year. These included hospital supplies of all kinds.

For the men in the trenches the most important articles required are socks. Two pairs of socks for every man in every unit leaving Fredericton always have been provided. For their work in connection with the Central Committee Mrs. W. G. Glenn and Miss E. B. Hunter have been appointed honorary members.

During the year the Central Committee has had \$5,527.83 contributed from various sources. The Women's Institutes have given valuable assistance. The primary chapters of the province have raised \$28,345.12, making a total of \$33,872.95.

At one o'clock the visitors were entertained at luncheon by the members of local chapters.
