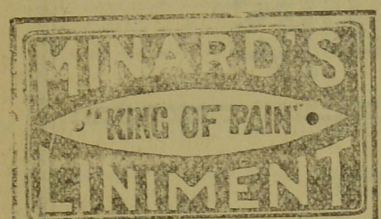

## PROBITS SALE OF FRESH BREAD

Paris, Feb. 10.—The sale of fresh bread in France is prohibited after Feb. 25 by decrees signed by President Poincaré and promulgated in the official journal.

The decrees also specify that bread must be made exclusively of whole wheat flour and that the loaves must not weigh less than 24 ounces nor exceed 31 inches in length.

The sale of all other forms of bread and rolls is forbidden.

## HOW MONEY WAS WASTED ON PATRIOTIC POTATOES

To the Editor of The Daily Mail:

Dear Sir:—The Hon. Mr. Murray, in Kings county on Tuesday night, challenged any man in New Brunswick to prove that in one single transaction he was dishonest, or that he had ever made a dishonest dollar out of the province. Not being a politician or much conversant with the inner mysteries of this brilliant galaxy that have had charge of our local affairs, I dare not say. I will leave that to those whose work it is to do those things. But I do know that for a crowd who claim to have given us a business administration, the present provincial lights are in a class all by themselves.

Mr. Murray says he is a business man. He also said that the spending of twelve hundred thousand dollars for the "patriotic potatoes" was good business. In fact, the people of Carleton county, so Mr. Murray says, said, "We have faith in our public men; we have faith in the government." They might also have said, seeing that they sold the potatoes and hay to the government, "We have works on the public, we have works from our government," for we know faith without good works is dead, especially faith without the portfolio of public works and the Valley Railway.

Now, when the government paid, or should I say gave, the Carleton county farmers one dollar a barrel for those potatoes, which were to be a gift to the poor of England and the starving Belgians, the market price of potatoes was from forty-five to sixty-five cents a barrel, in fact farmers in this county (York) left hundreds of barrels to rot or feed them to the pigs because all they could get was from forty-five to sixty-five cents a barrel for them. In view of this fact, why pay one dollar to the farmer of Carleton county ten cents for commission and \$2.18 landed on the other side? In that year, Mr. Editor, the farmers were asked to send produce as their private gift, and so many potatoes were at once sent that the Belgians Relief Committee sent word asking for some other things instead.

From the standpoint of practical or rather sharp politics as played by the honorable band in Carleton county, it is easy to see why they wanted the game continued, particularly as the Hon. Franklin (and Brutus was an honorable man, so are they all, all honorable men) was to be the leader of the good works, but their faith in him is child-like.

From an independent standpoint, the moral view of such elections is of the lowest possible quality.

Mr. Murray may be honest, but when he pays one dollar for a barrel

of potatoes that could be bought at the outside for sixty cents he is stupid, to put it mildly. As far as I can see, some thousands of dollars were simply handed as a gift to the poor farmers of Carleton county, which may or may not be the reason why that buyer of patriotic potatoes who, as The Gleaner said, has brought enough trouble to the party, is now the honorable minister of public works. Oh, honorable! what things are done and bearing thy name.

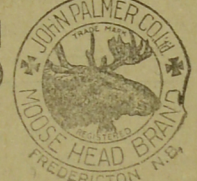
