## APPOINTMENT OF CITY CLERK WILL BE CONSIDERED

**Special Session of City Council Called For Tuesday--City Legislation And Other Matters to Come up.**

A special session of the City Council has been called for Tuesday night.

One of the important matters to be dealt with is the appointment of a City Clerk. It is doubtful if a permanent appointment will be made at this time, but it is possible that an arrangement will be made for City Treasurer Perkins to perform the duties of the office. The approach of a civic election makes it imperative that some action be taken.

The applicants for the position of City Clerk who have filed their applications are Mr. E. Allison MacKay, barrister, and Rev. D. W. Roberts.

### City Legislation.

Another matter which is to be up for discussion will be the legislation which the city will promote at the coming session of the House of Assembly. Thirty days' notice of legislation must be given and the House is expected to meet on March 15th. It is not known yet what legislation will be promoted.

### Government Nominations.

George A. Perley, of Margerville, and Parker Glasier, of Lincoln, were nominated by the government in Sunbury Saturday and Hon. A. R. Slipp and Alfred West, of Cole's Island, were nominated in Queens. In Northumberland the government party nominated J. L. Stewart, F. D. Swim, Lawrence Doyle and Jerome Gallant. Mr. J. B. Daggett, Secretary of Agriculture, spoke at the Sunbury nominations.

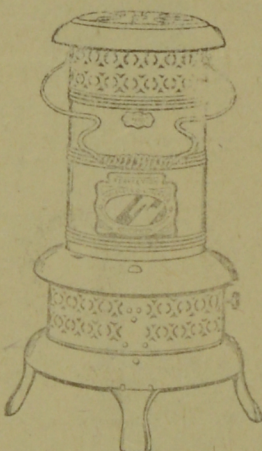
