During the conferring of degrees ushers presented the lady graduates with large bouquets of roses and carnations.

Sir Ezekiel McLeod.

Chief Justice Sir Ezekiel McLeod then gave a short address. He addressed the graduating class, pointing out to them the advantages of education. He congratulated the graduates on the high standing made by the class in receiving honors, medals and prizes. He spoke of the patriotism of the class and urged them to keep looking forward to the higher and greater advantages ahead.

Dr. W. S. Carter then spoke on the now all-important subject of food production. His address although short was well received and showed the in-

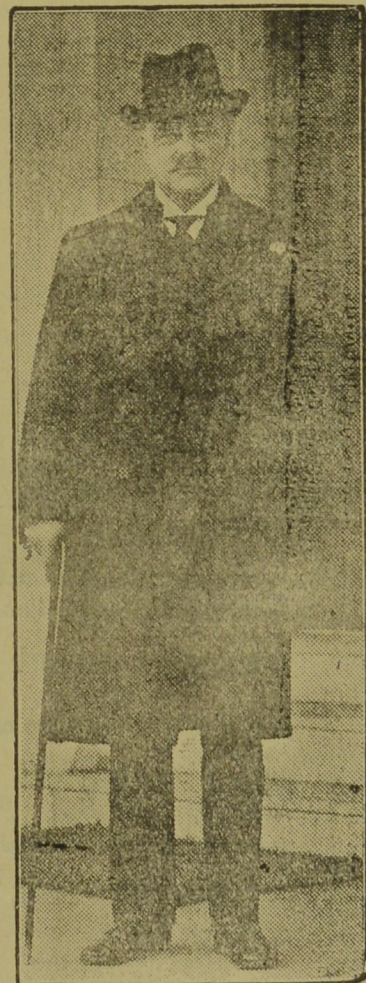
CAPTAIN EVANS LOANED TO U. S.

London, May 18.—In the course of an editorial on the Navy League lunch, the Times, referring to Admiral Sims' co-operation with the British Admiralty, says: "In return we are lending them Captain Evans of the destroyer leader Broke."

The Broke was one of the two British destroyers which engaged and defeated six German destroyers off Dover on the night of April 20. The Broke, after ramming one of the Germans, was attacked by two other enemy craft, while the crew of the rammed vessel attempted to board her. The boarders were driven into the sea and the two other destroyers put back to port.

GENERAL SMUTS MAY PRESIDE

Boer Leader Suggested as the Chairman of Proposed Convention of All the Irish Parties.

London, May 16.—The London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian, urged that General Smuts, the famous Boer leader, be invited to act as chairman of the Irish convention, if the latter materializes. The correspondent emphasizes the intellectual, oratorical and legal qualifications of the General, and is convinced that the appointment will be universally acclaimed.

U. S. HOSPITAL UNITS ARRIVE

London, May 18.—Sir Alfred Keogh, surgeon-General of the British army, announced today that the first of six fully organized and equipped hospital units which the American Red Cross is sending to France, arrived in England yesterday. The unit comprised about 300 persons, including twenty army medical officers, sixty nurses, and more than 200 other attaches.

This unit will be the first officially sanctioned by the United States to carry the American flag to the battlefields of France since the United States entered the war.

After a brief stay in England, the unit will be sent to the continent, where it will take charge of a base hospital behind the British front.

ITALIANS GET A HELPING HAND

London, May 18.—British heavy artillery batteries are co-operating with the Italian army in the Italian offensive against the Austrians on the Julian front, according to an official statement, which reads:

"British heavy artillery is co-operating with the Italian army in the offensive on the Julian front. Reports indicate that our gunners have afforded our allies material assistance."

"During their progress through Italy to the front they received an enthusiastic reception."
