Make the Most and Best Possible Use
of the High Priced Milk Supply
—Milk in Cooking.

Milk soups provide an excellent way
of supplying protein at a low cost.

Sometimes the milk may be mixed
with a weak meat stock, and some-
times as in vegetable purees, it may
form the basis of a dish of beans,
peas, potatoes, corn or celery pulp.

Milk and white or cream sauces are
valuable, not only for the nutritive
material they contain, but also as a
help in using up left-overs.

Bits of meat can be made attractive
by serving them on toast minced and
creamed; and many warmed-over vege-
tables are improved by the addition
of a milk or white sauce.

There is no end to the puddings and
desserts in which milk can be used.
Blanc mange is flavored milk, jellied
or thickened with starch. The cheap-
est kinds of ice creams are merely
thickened milk which has been fla-
vored and frozen.

Junket is simply milk curd separa-
ted by rennet.

Then there are all the puddings
made of some form of cereal and
starch, as bread, rice and cornstarch
puddings, tapioca creams and count-
less custards of which milk and eggs
make the basis.

These are nutritious and economi-
cal, and for children and persons of
weak digestion they are almost in-
dispensable.

WAR BREAD.

Here's the latest menu for "war
bread," claimed to be more nutritious
and cheaper than other breads. The
chef of the Hotel Martinique, in New
York, who planned the recipe, says
the bread is eaten throughout France
and lasts a week before getting stale.

The recipe is: Four ounces of rye
flour, 12 ounces whole wheat, 3 lbs.
of white flour, 1 quart water, a half-
ounce of yeast and 1 ounce salt.

**HOBLITZELL OF
THE RED SOX
ARMY DENTIST**

Boston First Baseman Will
Examine Teeth of Recruits
at Various Enlistment
Stations.

Washington, May 16.—Surgeon Gen-
eral W. C. Bristol of the Navy Depart-
ment announced to day that he has
confirmed the temporary appointment
of Dr. Richard C. Hoblitzell, first base-
man of the Red Sox, to assist in the
examination of the teeth of recruits in
the eight cities represented in the Am-
erican League.

"Hobby," as the D. D. S. is best
known, was presented to the Surgeon
General by Congressman Tague of
Boston upon his own suggestion. It
is planned that when the Boston base-
ball players visit the different cities,
Dr. Hoblitzell will report to the offi-
cers in charge of the several recruit-
ing stations.

"Hobby" will give an hour or so of
his time each morning examining the
teeth of the applicants for war ser-
vice. He will give his services gratis
and when the Red Sox return to the
capital he is to report to the Surgeon
General the result of his experiences
at the recruiting stations.
