EXPECTS FEW ELECTIONS WITHOUT A CONTEST

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Will Remain at Ottawa Until After Nomination Day--No Union Candidates in Sight in Several Quebec Ridings--Alberta Liberals Hold Monster Convention--Henri Bourassa Not in a Happy Mood.

Ottawa, Nov. 12. — Sir Wilfrid Laurier plans to remain in Ottawa from now until after nomination day. He will be nominated both for Ottawa and for Quebec East, the constituency he has represented continuously for forty years. So far no opposition to him has developed in the latter constituency and there is good prospect that he will be elected there by acclamation on Monday next. The day after nomination Sir Wilfrid expects to be able to announce his list of endorsed candidates throughout Canada in accordance with the provision of the Military Voters' act.

Present indications are that there will be straight Laurier Liberal candidates in at least three-quarters of the constituencies, while in most of the remaining seats there will be independent conscriptionist or Union Liberals. It is understood that independent Liberals who differ with Sir Wilfrid only on the conscription issue will be formally recognized by him as opposition candidates under the Military Voters' act. Very few acclamations are now expected.

There will be perhaps a dozen or so Union candidates elected by acclamation in western Canada and in the Maritime Provinces, and there may be as many Laurier candidates returned by acclamation in Quebec. In a number of the Quebec ridings no Union government candidate is yet in sight and apparently no one wants to tackle the job, unless all campaign expenses are fully provided out of the government's campaign fund.

Sir Wilfrid expects to leave for Winnipeg on Tuesday or Wednesday of next week and address a meeting there on Nov. 24. After that he will return to eastern Canada for meetings at Ottawa and Montreal the following week. It is not expected that Sir Robert Borden will visit the west during the campaign. He will leave the representation of the government's case out there in the hands of Messrs. Calder, Crerar, Meighen and Burrell. Sir Robert will devote his time to meetings in Ontario and the Maritime provinces.

In the West.

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 12.—Six hundred delegates, representing every constituency in Alberta, attended the provincial Liberal convention held in this city Saturday. It was a representative gathering of Liberals, who declared their loyalty to Laurier and the cause which he champions. Stirring addresses were made by Hon. Frank Oliver, Hon. A. G. MacKay, M.P.P., for Athabasca, and a dozen Liberal leaders of the province.

Cape Breton Situation.

Sydney, N. S., Nov. 12. — The Liberals of North Cape Breton will meet in convention at Baddeck tomorrow when D. D. MacKenzie will be nominated as standard bearer in the coming election. It is understood that John McCormack, Sydney Mines, several times an unsuccessful candidate in that riding will oppose Mr. MacKenzie.

Tonight the Liberal executive for South Cape Breton and Richmond will meet in Sydney to consider a proposition from the Conservatives of this constituency to run a Union ticket, composed of one Liberal and one Conservative. John C. Douglas, M. P., in the Nova Scotia legislature, is mentioned as the possible nominee of the Conservatives, while G. W. Kyte, M. P. for Richmond, in the last parliament, is spoken of as a likely Liberal representative on the ticket.

In Inverness county, Dr. Chisholm, Liberal representative for many years will likely be returned by acclamation.

M.L.A.'s Chosen.

Montreal, Nov. 13. — H. Fortier, M. L. A. for Labelle, and Arthur Trépan, M. L. A. for Nicolet, have been chosen as Liberal candidates in the Federal elections for their respective constituencies.

Martin's Successor.

Montreal, Nov. 13.—Dr. Deslauriers was the unanimous choice of the Liberals of St. Mary's division as the Federal candidate at a nominating convention last night. Mayor Martin was the late member.

Bourassa Not Happy.

Montreal, Nov. 13. — Henri Bourassa seems not very happy in casting in his lot with Sir Wilfrid Laurier in this election. He winds up a series of articles in his paper, Le Devoir, today by stating "needless to say we are not more united to the Liberal party on the Laurier manifesto than we were to the Conservatives in 1911."

After declaring that nationalism is not a party, Bourassa says: "The immediate evil to combat is the policy of the ministry, the policy of disunion and of national treason, and although the opposition is far from satisfactory, it is less an evil than the ministry." He is not in favor of putting National candidates in the field because of the risk it would entail in weakening the efforts of the opposition.

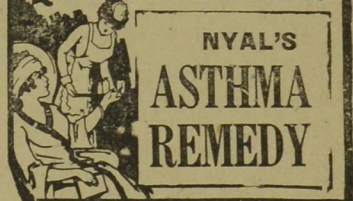
