SCRUTINEERS
APPOINTED

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—Under the Military Voters' Act the government will have to appoint three scrutineers, two overseas and one in Canada, to see that the soldiers' vote is fairly taken.

It is understood that the government's selections of scrutineers are as follows: Col. Manley for France; Col. A. T. Thompson for England; J. F. Orde, K. C., Ottawa, for Canada.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has also the right to choose three scrutineers to act in behalf of the opposition, and he has requested the appointment of the following: W. T. R. Preston, London, for England; Godfrey Langlois, Paris, for France; W. R. Hearn, Sydney, N. S., for Canada.

RELEASED ON
HEAVY BAIL

Montreal, Nov. 9.—Charles Desjardins, the detective who worked for the Dominion Police in gathering evidence against the dynamiting gang here last summer, and who is charged with conspiracy, etc., in connection with the gang, was liberated yesterday afternoon on bail for \$30,000.

TRIBUNALS
WILL BE BUSY

Montreal, Nov. 8.—Two hundred exemption tribunals operating under the Military Service Act were opened here this morning. They are expected to handle a large number of the 50,000 eligibles who have so far not registered.

The Montreal Association of Pharmacy has made application to the Military Service Council at Ottawa that all students of pharmacy be exempted from military draft.

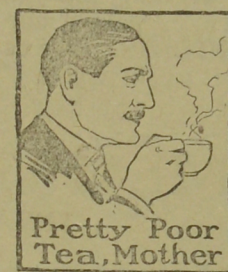
U. S. THANKSGIVING DAY.

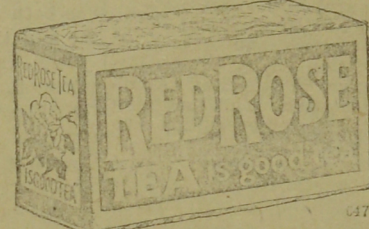
