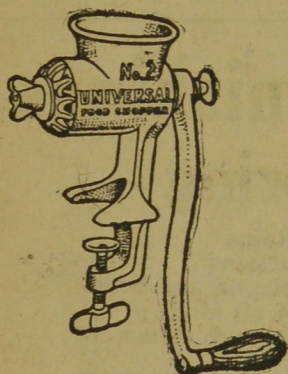

MARITIME PROVINCES WILL BE REPRESENTED

Hon. J. D. Hazen to Quit Politics to Accept the Dignified Position of Chief Justice of New Brunswick--Nine Liberals Like- ly to Have Portfolios in the Fusion Gov- ernment--Sir Wilfrid Laurier Keeping Close Touch With His Liberal Friends.

Ottawa, Oct. 12. — Although final
and authoritative announcement will
not be made until tomorrow as to the
representatives of the Maritime Pro-
vinces in the union government, it was
practically settled tonight that New
Brunswick would be represented by
F. B. Carvell and Nova Scotia by
either Premier Murray or A. K. Mac-
Lean, with chances favoring the lat-
ter.

Mr. Carvell, before giving his final
consent, has been waiting for the de-
cision of his Nova Scotia colleagues.

Mr. Carvell did not want to go into
the government as the only representa-
tive of the Maritime Province Lib-
erals. Premier Murray and Mr. Mac-
Lean confronted suddenly with the
new situation on arrival here last
night, were naturally not able to give
any decision offhand and sought time
today to communicate with their
friends in Nova Scotia and to canvass
the problems of union government
with the Liberals who have already
entered the cabinet as well as with
Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid
Laurier. It is understood that while
Premier Murray gives his support to
the principle of union government un-
der existing conditions, he personally
prefers to stay at the helm of his own
province. Premier Borden has offered
portfolios to either Mr. Murray or
Mr. MacLean and it is regarded as certain
tonight that one of the other of them
will come in. On that understanding
Mr. Carvell will be sworn in as a min-
ister tomorrow and possibly at the
same time the Nova Scotia representa-
tive will enter the ministry.

Hon. J. D. Hazen, who is retiring,
will, it is understood, become chief
justice of New Brunswick.

Hon. Mr. Crothers, is also to get a
judgeship, it is understood.

The Complicated Details.

Now that union government is
achieved, interest is centring to a
large degree upon the working out of
the complicated details in connection
with the selection of candidates for
the coming election, the administra-
tion of the election machinery, etc.
With the bulk of Conservative and
Liberal candidates already in the
field representing the two great parties
and with political predictions and
prjudices still strong throughout the
country, the question arises as to who
is to be the government candidate, or
how the choice is to be made between
nominated candidates in each consti-
tuency should both adopt the union
government platform. As a matter of
fact, while details in regard to the
question of candidates have not yet
been finally agreed upon the under-
standing reached with the Liberal
leaders who have gone into the gov-
ernment was that there shall be no
distinction between Liberal or Con-
servative candidates pledged to sup-
port the union government. In cases
where a constituency has two such
candidates, one Conservative and one
Liberal, both can run on an equal
footing so far as government influ-
ence or imprimatur are concerned. In
that case while political affiliations
may influence the vote in favor of one
candidate or the other, perhaps to a
deciding extent, the personal equation
will also be an important factor. It
is believed that the best elements will
vote for the best man, thus leading to
the best personnel in the new parlia-
ment.

In many instances it is believed that
candidates and their followers will en-
deavor to get together, follow the
lead of government policies and agree
among themselves on one union candi-
date, thus insuring his election
against a possible anti-conscription-
ist and anti-government candidate. It
is recognized that in a majority of the
constituencies having regard to hu-
man nature this would be very diffi-
cult of consummation. With a view,
however, to giving assistance along
this line, it is proposed to appoint two
representatives of the government for
each province, one Liberal and one

PROGRESS MADE BY THE FRENCH

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

New York, Oct. 13.—France has for
a year been producing 250,000 shells
a day for the famous "75" guns, as
compared with 13,000 daily when the
war began, and R. E. Tardie, French
high commissioner in the United
States, said in a statement here yes-
terday, his estimate of credits voted
by France from August of 1914 until
America entered the conflict was near-
ly \$31,000,000,000, of which more than
nineteen and a half billion came from
the savings of the French people.

M. Tardie also said that in 1914
France had only three hundred heavy
guns, organized in regiments. Now
she has more than six thousand. Be-
sides, she has given more than 800
heavy guns to Russia and Rumania
and other allies.

More than two-thirds and nearly
three-fourths of the western front is
still occupied by the French army,
which has 2,700,000 men in the field.

Sir Wilfrid Philosophical.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who has watch-
ed philosophically the developments
of the past few days and who has
been throughout in close touch with
his Liberal friends both for and
against union, before an election, will
issue a statement probably on Monday
next outlining his position towards
the main national issues at stake. Sir
Wilfrid is determined to pursue his
own course steadfastly as leader of
the opposition and will endeavor to
fulfill to the utmost of his strength,
judgment, experience and influence
his responsibilities and his opportuni-
ties for national service and for na-
tional unity. He was at his office all
day receiving many callers and advis-
ing all to consider only the conscien-
tious oath of duty.

By 8 o'clock Thursday night the
Liberal conference was under way
and announcement was made from
the premier's office that its result
was anticipated by 9.30. At that time
however, there were no signs of ad-
journing; in fact it was after that
hour before Mr. Pardee reached the
Chateau Laurier having, it is under-
stood, been at the home of Sir Wilfrid
Laurier discussing the situation with
the Liberal leader. Mr. Pardee mer-
ely nodded to the waiting crowd of
newspaper men and hurried to the ele-
vator. It was reported that he was
subsequently in consultation with
Hon. Mr. Calder and Messrs. Carvell
and Rowell.

The main conference then resumed
shortly after 10 o'clock. The news
leaked that prospects were bright for
the immediate consummation of union.
This was confirmed shortly after
by the appearance at the premier's
office of Rodolphe Boudreau, clerk of
the privy council and the story start-
ed that the new ministers would prob-
ably be sworn in at once.
