WAR TIME ELECTION IN CANADA IS NOW CERTAIN

Motion for an Extension Meets With Strong Opposition in Parliament---An Amendment by Hon. G. P. Graham Defeated by the Narrow Margin of 17 Votes ---No Chance for a Coalition Cabinet.

Ottawa, July 18—The die is cast. Within the next two months Canadians will witness a general election,—the first in six years.

By a vote of 82 to 62 the house at midnight approved of the extension resolution submitted by Premier Borden. Six Liberals voted with the government. Six Conservatives voted with the Opposition.

Sir Robert told the house frankly that unless the resolution carried with practical unanimity it could not go forward to the imperial parliament at London. The division leaves the member speculating as to whether they will go before the electors in August or September. Few look for the election as late as November.

Coalition government is off until after polling. Fred F. Pardee, the chairman of the Liberals who supported the principle of the military service act, made that plain in his impressive speech tonight. He attributed its failure to "different and conflicting elements on both sides of the house."

The prime minister, in proposing the resolution for a year's further ex-

over-bore any technical constitutional conventions. He pleaded that there should be a setting aside of all partisanship and political strife and with an extended parliamentary term "a government formed by fair union of both political parties."

Hon. Geo. P. Graham Replies

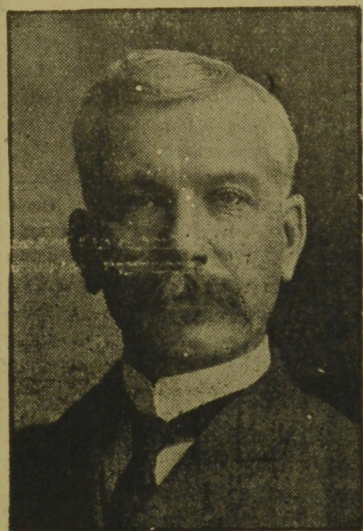
When the prime minister sat down, to the surprise of most members of the house, it was not Sir Wilfrid Laurier but his first lieutenant, Hon. George P. Graham who rose. Mr. Graham in a brief but clear-cut speech, put before the government an alternative proposal to immediate consideration of the extension resolution in the following terms: "That the consideration of the terms of the said resolution should be deferred until the government brings before parliament measures providing that those able to pay will be asked to contribute their full share to the cost of the war and by which all agricultural industrial, transportation and natural resources of Canada will be organized so as to insure the greatest possible assistance to the empire and the war and to reduce the cost of living to the Canadian people."

The amendment which, with a few changes, is practically the same as the one of which Hon. Mr. Graham had given notice some weeks ago, provides that before the government is given a mandate to carry on for another year it should produce a vigorous constructive programme of domestic organization of all resources of the country—the second and equally important problem of war work necessary to back up the armies in the field.

Endorsed Conscription

Hon. Mr. Graham emphasized particularly organization for food production. He made it clear that his amendment of large incomes which do not now contribute anything like a fair share towards meeting the burden of war.

Hon. Mr. Graham endorsed fully the principle of selective conscription and made it clear that his amendment did not in any way interfere with the passing or the enforcement of the government's measure. But with only one part of its duty done he appealed for a tangible pledge that the other and equally necessary half of national war service would be undertaken by

tension of parliament, pleaded the war crisis, the divisions and dissipation of energy which would result from the turmoil of an election and the practical disfranchisement of the men at the front.

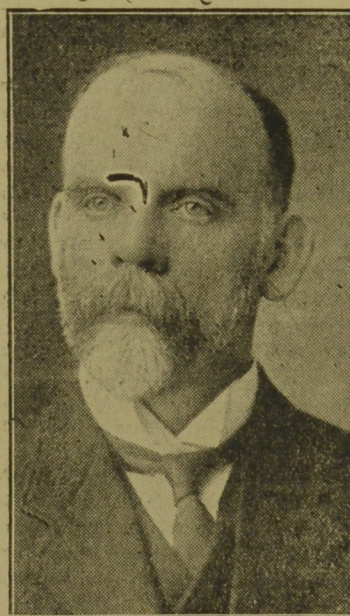

this parliament before it voted itself another year's tenure of power.

Sir George Foster, who followed Hon. Mr. Graham for an hour and a half, gave but a partial pledge. He announced that an income tax would be introduced and passed by this parliament. The belated acquiescence in what Liberalism has been demanding without success ever since the war started was a concession to unmistakable public demand and a first fruit of Liberal war policy. For the rest, Sir George's speech was an apology for Government failure to handle the cost of living problem, the transportation problem, the ship building problem, etc.

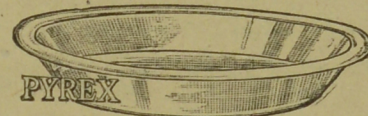

He covered the constitutional issue at stake, the abortive attempts at forming a coalition government under circumstances which the Prime Minister must have known could not be successful, and pleaded that the only way to secure anything like unity of effort, stable government and public confidence, was to trust the people and appeal to them for a new mandate.
