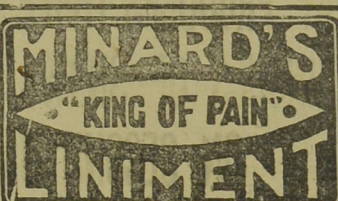

of an Act or Acts for the following pur-  
poses or objects:

- To provide authority for the removal,  
pulling down or destruction of dan-  
gerous or dilapidated buildings.
- To provide authority for the proper  
control and protection of the Sinking  
Funds of the City of Fredericton.
- To amend and extend the provisions of
