That the war will result in the general recognition of the principle of nationality, the pasing of American isolation, the abolition of the wage system and the economic and political equality of women were among the ideas expressed by Dr. William Harman van Allen at the Church of the Advent last evening. He also expressed the strong conviction that this country will have prohibition established within three months, to last for the period of the war, at least.

place."

The war, he said, is going to vindicate the idea that one nation shall be governed by another nation, and, referring specifically to Ireland, remarked: "There is no other nation on earth that should govern Ireland but Ireland itself." He regards the granting of home rule as necessary to the realization of the vision of the Allies. He sugested an autonomous Bohemia and a southern Slav state, which might become two members of a "loose federation," and said that something like this is going to come omething like this is going to come al along the line.

He regarded the statement of the new Russian government concerning the autonomy of Poland and the giv-ing back to Finland of its rfedom as

a most happy announcement.

The speaker expressed the hope that the world will see an autonomous Armenia, and that some way will be found of creating a Jewish state in Palestine. He went further and expressed the hope that there might come about the conversion of the Jews to Jesus as King of the Jews.

The absolute futility of the balance

The absolute futility of the balance of power was pronounced by the speaker, who itimated that the arguments for it put him in much the same frame of mind as when he heard that "carleads of eggs were held back from use on private sidings while the people suffer, that a ship load of bananas had recently been thrown overboard near this harbor to hold up the price, and that 32,000 crates of Spanish onions had spoiled in New York harbor because there was no place to unload them."


A true world court and federation of nations, he predicts. As to the wage system, he pointed out that whenever the workers through organization secured higher wages that the cost of living went up more than enough to balance and remarked: "Teh whole system, I think, is going down. I believe we are going to see within three years after the war such an extension of the principle of cooperation as will lead to the abolition of the wage system." He said that he looked for the watchful regulation of the government over industry.

Having expressed his belief that women will take their places on an equal basis with men in the industry of the "co-operative Commonwealth," he said that suffrage is coming in England and this country. He predicted that this would bring about a great purification of politics.

He hoped to see the end of all kings, the passing of all political bosses and party machines. The clergyman remarked that "party machinery" had not worked well in certain high appointments, specifically indicating a present cabinet officer.



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
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
