SOME NEW RECIPES.

Currant Buns.

Sift together two cupfuls of flour, a half teaspoonful each of cinnamon and soda, and a quarter teaspoonful of salt. Add half a cupful of dried currants to this and then add half a cupful of sour milk. Form into buns or bake in muffin pans.

Fried Bananas.

Peel and halve the bananas. Beat up an egg and prepare a mixture of a half-cup of sugar and a half-cup of flour. Dip each piece of banana in the

egg, and then in the flour and sugar mixture, and fry in deep fat.

Orange Sponge.

One-third box of gelatine, one-third cup of cold water, one-third cup of boiling water, one cup of sugar, one tablespoonful strained lemon juice, 1 cup strained orange juice, whites of three eggs, one cup of whipped cream. Soak the gelatine over night in the cold water. In the morning dissolve in the boiling water and add the sugar, lemon and orange juices. Set the mixture in a bowl immersed in cold water or in cracked ice to chill. Before it begins to set add the beaten whites of the egg and the whipped cream. Have a mold lined with lady fingers or with sponge cake and pour the gelatine cream in the centre.

STEAMED BROWN BREAD.

A Dark Delight, an Excellent Breakfast Bread.

One cup molasses, 2 cups sour milk or buttermilk, a half teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 3 cups cornmeal, 1 cup graham or white flour. Mix all ingredients to smooth batter, pour into greased cans (tin coffee cans or baking powder cans are good sizes), cover and steam them three hours. Water must boil all the time. This brown bread is equally good hot or cold. It can be reheated by slicing and steaming for about ten minutes. Hot it makes an excellent breakfast bread and one that is very easily prepared.

TWO GREAT HORSES DIED LAST WEEK

Arion Highest Priced Stallion in World—Charley Herr Noted for His Great Endurance.

Death last week removed two trotters that were well known, Arion, 2,074, and Charley Herr, 2,07. The first-named stands in history as having brought the top price for a trotting bred horse, the late J. Malcolm Forbes having paid Palo Alto farm \$125,000 for the son of Electioneer and Manette. Arion was then the speed sensation of the turf and was brought to Massachusetts to head the stud at Forbes' farm. He had trotted in 2.10% as a two-year-old, pulling a high-wheel sulky, a performance that has never been approached by any other trotter of that age.

Arion, after becoming Forbes' property, was trained considerably, but never regained championship form. In the stud he was not strikingly successful, but he sired one trotter while standing at Ponkapog that gave his owner satisfaction for the fortune that it took to bring the horse east. This was Nico that Henry Titer raced to a mark of 2.08% as a 4-year-old and who gave promise of training on to the world's record. Death cut short his career, but he will always be remembered by the many men who saw him train at Readville as the fastest trotter ever trained there until Bob Proctor began to school Uhlman.

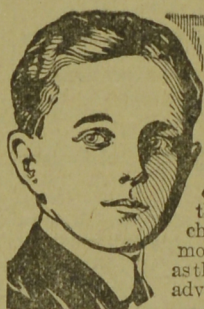
The fee of Arion his first season at Forbes farm was \$2,500 and one of the men who bred to him was the late Andy Welch who then owned Directress 2.19. From the union came Fanelia 2.13, the dam of Sadie Mac, 2.06%, and the great sire Todd, 2.14%.

Charley Herr, while he fell some short of being a speed champion, was a trotter whose stamina won for him the regard of every race follower along the Grand Circuit. A sluggish horse, he was seemingly almost cruelly punished by most of his drivers, and the memory of his first race at Readville is not a pleasant one. He was then a three-year-old and was driven by John Kelly, who hit the colt at every stride.

RUTH SUSPENDED, FINE PROBABLE

Boston, June 27. — Babe Ruth has been suspended by Ban Johnson pending a thorough investigation of his trouble with Umpire "Brick" Owens on Saturday. President Johnson will not take any definite action on the case until he has received a written report of the trouble from the umpire which should reach him his office today.

Yesterday "Babe" warmed up prior to the first game, but spent most of the balance of the afternoon in the grandstand.

M'GRAW LIABLE HEAVY PENALTY

One rule in the National League provides that all managers and players shall lose their salary for the days they are under suspension and, further, should a club not deduct salary for the term of the suspension it is liable to a fine.

McGraw is said to receive \$30,000 a season from the New York club, and if the rule is enforced will be shy a matter of \$2,666.56 in his next pay check, which with the \$500 fine added, would make \$3,166.56.
