The scene of the Russian success, between the Stripa and Zlota rivers, was the battle ground of such heavy fighting after General Brusiloff's offensive of a year ago, Koniuchy being on the latter river.

Like the other demonstrations, it is in the direction of Lembers, the capture of which would be of the gretaest strategic and political importance. General Brusiloff apparently has resumed his concentric manouvre, which was interrupted by the advent of winter and then by the revolutions.




