HOTELS COOPERATING WITH THE FOOD ADMINISTRATION

(New York Sun.)

Eighty per cent. of American hotels already are co-operating with the National Food Administration in a practical way, and since Oct. 1 5,000,000 pounds of meat has been saved, weekly by them, according to John McE. Bowman, manager of the Biltmore Hotel.

Mr. Bowman is a member of the Food Administration in charge of hotels, restaurants, dining cars and passenger boats. Statistics showing what has been done in the country so far have just been collected by him, assisted by New York State hotel men here in convention and other hotel men who are attending the Second

Annual Hotel Men's Exposition at Grand Central Palace.

"There are still some slackers, of course," said Mr. Bowman today, "but they will be found out, as all slackers are, and the time will soon be here when every hotel in the land will stand by the Food Administration to the smallest detail."

He showed figures from two New York organizations giving results of their "meatless days."

A statement from the Childs restaurants was to the effect that they had saved on a single meatless Tuesday 12,000 pounds of meat. On the day in question, the report said, only 15 per cent. of the usual amount of meat was sold, and this to patrons who insisted. Since then the Childs restaurants have stopped selling meat on meatless Tuesdays altogether.

The New York Central Railroad Company reported that it saved 12,000 pounds of meat in a week on one line by following suggestions of the Food Administration.

Of the 5,000,000 pounds of meat being saved weekly by hotels in the nation New York is saving 500,000 pounds, he said. One New York hotel reported for its second "meatless day" a saving of 700 pounds of beef, 600 pounds of lamb, 350 pounds of pork and 70 pounds of veal. One wholesale meat dealer's sales dropped off 100,000 pounds on Tuesday.

Mr. Bowman is speaking to the hotel men urged still further conservation. He suggested "meatless hash" as another step to be taken. The fruition of the hopes of the convention will be seen tonight at the Waldorf, where the annual banquet of the New York Hotel Men's Association will be held.

U.S. TROOPS IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Nov. 19. — For the first time in the life of the present generation, if indeed not for the first time since the declaration of independence armed American troops paraded in this city this morning, in connection with the Victory Loan procession, and carried their flag side by side with the Union Jack. The American detachment arrived in Montreal yesterday morning and were given a warm reception by local military men as well as by the Canadian Pacific Railway officials. The detachment, which is in charge of Lieut. Col. Rhea, of the national army, consists of fifty infantrymen of the 385th U. S. infantry (all drafted men) and fifty marines, with a naval band of fifty gunners and artillery band of thirty. They had the position of honor in the parade of ten thousand citizens.

CANDIDATES CHOSEN FOR ALL NEW BRUNSWICK SEATS

Two Conservatives Running in Westmorland--Dr. McAllister Drops Out in Kings and is Succeeded by Fred E. Sharp--D. A. Stewart, M. P. P. Opposing Pius Michaud in Restigouche-Madawaska.

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 19. — At Dorchester today a large crowd attended nomination proceedings. At 12 o'clock Sheriff I. N. Killam, with Gesner Taylor as his clerk, declared election court opened. George R. McCord filed nomination papers of Arthur Bliss Copp of Sackville; A. E. Metzler filed nomination papers of Otto Baird Price of Moncton; Wesley McAnn filed nomination papers of Adelbert Cavour Chapman of Moncton. At 2 o'clock the candidates began addressing the electors, as follows: A. B. Copp, half an hour; Dr. O. B. Price, half an hour, and Mr. Chapman half an hour, Mr. Copp fifteen minutes in reply.

The speeches were followed with deep interest. Dr. Price claimed he was recognized as a Union candidate up to Thursday noon and had been instructed by Hon. Mr. Carvell to go ahead with organization, and that he did not know where "Chapman came in."

Dr. Price said the matter had been referred to Premier Borden for his decision. Mr. Chapman claimed that he was the authorized Union candidate and had been so recognized by the minister of public works.

Mr. Chapman is being supported by F. W. Sumner, Matthew Lodge, F. C. Robinson and others.

In Restigouche-Madawaska. Campbellton, N. B., Nov. 19. — The nomination papers of David A. Stewart, Union candidate, and Pius Michaud, Liberal, for the counties of Madawaska and Restigouche were filed today. A public meeting was held in the Opera House at 2:30 o'clock. Mayor Andrew of Campbellton, and B. R. Violett of Edmundston, acted as joint chairmen, and all the speakers were accorded a good hearing.

Speeches were delivered by the candidates and Hon. L. A. Dugal, Hon. William Currie, A. T. LeBlanc and J. E. Michaud, M.P.P.

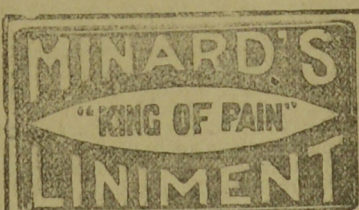

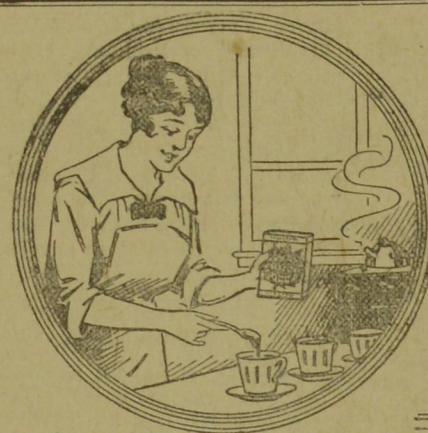
