VICTORY LOAN
CAMPAIGN

Toronto, Nov. 19. — It was estimated at midnight last night that the \$100,000,000 mark had been passed in the Victory Loan campaign. At Dominion headquarters incomplete reports showed a total of \$95,343,600 but the unreported subscriptions would bring the actual figures for the first week well in advance of the century mark. Some of the provinces have reported for only three or four days, Ontario with \$54,957,100 is the only one officially covered by full returns up to Saturday night.

Following are the figures so far sent in to headquarters: Prince Edward Island, \$1,729,700; Nova Scotia, \$3,463,650; New Brunswick, \$2,193,800; Quebec, \$1,363,150; Montreal (city and island) \$13,898,300; Ontario, \$56,904,700; Manitoba, \$7,262,850; Saskatchewan, \$3,318,700; South Alberta, \$2,289,650; North Alberta, \$1,113,800; British Columbia, \$1,805,300. This makes a grand total for the Dominion of \$95,346,600.

City of Fredericton
Board of HealthNotice of Compulsory
Vaccination.

The Fredericton Board of Health, District No. 1, having been ordered by the Provincial Board of Health, under the provisions of Section 39 of the Public Health Act 1911 to enforce compulsory vaccination for smallpox, all residents of the City of Fredericton, over the age of four (4) years, who have not been vaccinated within 5 years of November 1st, 1917, must be vaccinated on or before Friday, the 30th day of November next, unless physically unfit, and submitting the Certificate of a duly qualified physician to that effect.

This Board has decided that instead of dividing the City into Districts and assigning a physician to a particular district, they will allow each physician to vaccinate any resident of the city who may request him so to do. Residents of the City can therefore choose their own physician to perform the service, which will be free of any charge to them.

Any persons refusing or neglecting to obey the above order, on or before Friday, the 30th day of November, 1917, will subject themselves to the provisions and penalties of Rules Numbers 40, 41 and 42 of the Public Health Act 1911.

The parent or guardian having the charge or custody of any minor under the age of sixteen years will be held responsible for the proper observance of this Order.
