Work about the Legislative buildings and Normal School must have been slack in 1915, as Mr. Fleming was only able to put in 283 days. His record of 325 working days for 1916 therefore still stands. No returns are yet available for 1916, which was a leap year with no elections.

"About to Introduce."

(St. John Telegraph.)
For five or six years the local government has represented itself as "about to introduce" all sorts of reforms and beneficial measures. Now, on the eve of an election, ministers of the crown are again feeding the public lavishly upon promises. The Government is proclaiming its third road policy after eight years of waste and neglect and petty trafficking in patronage. It is still talking about the future of the Valley Railway, although its policy delayed the completion of that railway by two or three years, wasted hundreds of thousands of dollars in connection with the job, and finally shut off the Valley road from any connection with the Transcontinental such as would insure a share of the through traffic.

The Minister of Agriculture is still talking about a policy of settlement of the vacant lands of New Brunswick, although year after year his government's failure in that respect has been written in conspicuous letters before the eyes of the people. The Legislature has not yet had a detailed report of the operations of the famous Farm Settlement Board, but the public now knows that members of the Legislature and their political associates have trafficked in abandoned farms through that board. We do not find the government producing a long list of successful and contented farmers, brought to New Brunswick through the Department of Agriculture, but Hon. Mr. Murray goes on discussing indefinite schemes for settling returned soldiers on the land, avoiding details, but not succeeding in hiding the fact that nothing actually has been accomplished. A vast expenditure of breath and a tremendous output of generalities has been a strong characteristic of the Murray brand of statesmanship for years. He talks, and talks and talks, but always he avoids telling the people why he cast his vote for and assisted in passing through the Legislature, that whitewashing resolution for the comfort and exculpation of the Hon. Jas. K. Flemming, who is now announced as one of the principal advocates of Mr. Murray and his associates. Well, one good turn deserves another. But so long as Murray goes about the country making pious pretensions of righteousness and high public morality, he at least should realize, as the electors do, that he owes the people a complete explanation of his course in championing the ex-Premier.

What's in a name? Had the minister of public works been named after G. Washington instead of B. Franklin, would we have any more faith in his promises?

DR. MOREHOUSE, M. P. P. WAS BADLY TREATED Has Not Appeared on a Political Platform in This Campaign.

The Standard in its issue of today announces that Dr. Crocket, one of the Government candidates in York, "nailed an Opposition lie" last night when he denied the report that Dr. Morehouse, ex-M. P. P., is supporting the Opposition candidates in York. He is alleged to have said further that Dr. Morehouse had promised to address a meeting at Springfield Thursday evening in the Government interest. No explanation was offered to show why Dr. Morehouse has not long before this come to the assistance of the Government candidates. Dr. Morehouse attended the Government convention here three weeks ago and was turned down by the party machine. He was not even given a chance to thank the electors for previous support. He left the Convention in disgust, and has up to the present taken no part in the campaign.

In his speech on nomination day Mr. Elwood Burrill paid a tribute to Dr. Morehouse and intimated that he was not pleased at the shabby treatment he had received. It is known that agents of the government have been following Dr. Morehouse for a fortnight beseeching him to come back into line. We know nothing of what promises he may have made, but we know that there is not money enough in York county to induce him to vote for Mr. John Young. The Opposition candidates have no quarrel with Dr. Morehouse and did not misrepresent his position in the least.
