PRESERVING EGGS.

This is the Time to Preserve the Surplus Stock of Eggs.

April, May and June make the great egg-producing season of the year.

This is the time for all those who keep hens to preserve the surplus stock of eggs for next fall and winter. It is wise for housewives who buy eggs to invest in dozens of the strictly fresh kind at spring prices and store them against a coming high cost crisis.

The easiest and perhaps best method which can be employed is the use of water glass or sodium silicate. This water glass should be mixed one part water glass to nine parts water which has been previously boiled. The solution should be kept in a clean receptacle, such as a crock or stone jar. Eggs or barrels may be used but they should be scalded thoroughly and absolutely free from odors. After the jar has been partially filled with the water glass solution the eggs can be put in from day to day, and should remain at least two inches below the surface.

Eggs thus stored in a cool dark place will come out during the following winter as a very good article of food.

One gallon of water glass will make solution to cover nearly 50 dozen eggs.

How to Preserve in Lime.

Eggs can also be preserved in lime water, salt, patent egg preservatives, or they can be greased and stored in sawdust or bran. But eggs packed in salt are liable to lose as much as 33 per cent. by evaporation, while those which are greased sometimes lose 25 p.c. Moreover, they become tainted, while eggs preserved in water glass are not only satisfactory when taken from the solution, but may be kept for three or four weeks after removal.

If it is desired to preserve eggs in lime water, the solution may be prepared by placing 2 or 3 pounds of un-slacked lime in 5 gallons of water allowing the mixture to stand until the lime settles and the liquid is clear.

The eggs should be covered with the clear lime water.

THE PROHIBITION BILL DISCUSSED IN THE HOUSE

A Proposal to Make It Unlawful to Advertise Intoxicating Liquors in Newspapers or on Bill Boards--A Complaint That Venders Charge Excessive Prices--The Marriage Act Discussed by the House in Committee.

The Legislature met at three o'clock. Mr. Mersereau presented the report of the committee on agriculture.

Mr. Smith (Carleton) gave notice of inquiry as to the cost of the increased Production convention, also as to the dismissal of David Jackson, bridge superintendent, Carleton county.

Mr. Sutton gave notice of inquiry as to the dismissal of Frank Glidden, caretaker of the Woodstock bridge.

Mr. Peck gave notice of inquiry as follows: "Did the Minister of Public Works instruct the Supervisor of roads in the Parish of Hillsboro to only repair roads suitable for carriages, but not to be particular to make roads passable for automobiles?"

Mr. Speaker said the phraseology of that inquiry was objectionable inasmuch as it contained a statement of fact whereas it should contain nothing but the actual inquiry.

Mr. Baxter said he should have to appeal to the House from the Speaker's ruling. The inquiry was phrased in a manner to call for an answer yes or no.

Mr. Speaker said that he had noticed a tendency on the part of members making inquiries to introduce irrelevant matters which had no place in notices of inquiry and the practice should cease.

Mr. Smith (Carleton) said he thought Dr. Speaker was confusing the answers to the inquiries, not the inquiries themselves.

Mr. Speaker—"Possibly both" adding that the inquiry had better be drawn while he considered the point.

Mr. Burchill presented the petition of the Town Council of the Town of Chatham in favor of a bill to authorize the said town to issue debentures, also the petition of the Southwest Boom Company in favor of a bill to consolidate and amend the several acts relating to the company.

Mr. Sutton presented a petition from the Town of Woodstock in favor of a bill relating to that town.

Mr. Potts presented the petition of the St. John River Hydro-Electric Company in favor of the bill to amend the act incorporating the said company.

Mr. Michaud presented petitions from the town of Edmundston in favor of a bill to amend the act relating to the agreement between the town and Frasers, Ltd., also to authorize the town to issue debentures and to amend the act incorporating the town.

Hon. Mr. Byrne introduced bills to amend the Workmen's Compensation Act, to aid and facilitate the work of the Commission appointed to inquire into the working of the Ontario and Nova Scotia Compensation Act, and a bill to repeal the act relating to short-hand reporting in certain courts. He also laid upon the table the report of the Workmen's Compensation Act Commission.

Hon. Mr. Robinson introduced a bill to confirm the assessments made in aid of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, also a bill to provide for the refunding of provincial and municipal indebtedness and also a bill to provide for the funding of certain expenditures in connection with the Jordan Sanitarium.

Woman Suffrage.

Hon. Mr. Roberts pursuant to notice introduced a bill to amend the New Brunswick Elections Act. This bill, he explained, was the final outcome of years of effort on the part of ladies of New Brunswick. It was promoted by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, The King's Daughters and other Women's organizations and its idea was to give women equal suffrage with men.

On the order of the day being called Hon. Mr. Robinson asked that supply be allowed to stand over for a day or two.

The Marriage Law.

The House went into Committee with Mr. Leger (Westmorland) in the chair and took up the consideration of the bill to consolidate and amend the Law relating to the Solemnization of Marriage.

Hon. Mr. Robinson said the bill was simply a consolidation of the existing acts and contained no amendment whatever to the law as it now stood.

Mr. Baxter said in looking through the sections of the bill it occurred to him that there was one case where some little amendment to the law might be advisable. In England prior to the passing of Lord Hardwick's act the marriage of persons under 18 years of age was not necessarily invalid because the consent of the parents had not been obtained. There was a decision in the courts of New Brunswick that the English law held good here, and he thought it might be advisable to avoid anything which might be likely to question the validity of a marriage under such circumstances in this country. The bill could be added to without any difficulty. Another question which it might be well to consider while they were dealing with this subject was to the status of children who were unfortunate enough to be born prior to the marriage of their

parents. In most European countries the subsequent marriage of the parents placed children born before marriage in the same position in regard to civil rights as children born afterwards. This also was the law in one province of this dominion if not two, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and he thought the time had arrived when the same law should be in force in this province.

Protection Needed.

Hon. Mr. Byrne thought that some greater protection should be thrown around the issuing of marriage licenses. Under existing conditions people come from the State of Maine who for some cause or other are not able to get married in that state, but have no difficulty in doing so in this province. Persons seeking marriage licenses should be obliged to make an affidavit as to their status and age and if they will not make any affidavit notice of the intended marriage should be published for some days beforehand.

Mr. Potts said there appeared to him to be enough in the bill to require very careful consideration. Conditions had materially changed since the requirements of the marriage licenses first came in. He thought that the marriage of young people should be encouraged and not hindered, particularly in view of the present situation in the country.

Mr. Baxter said that the act of 1915 had been framed with a view of preventing clandestine marriages. In regard to banns the parties might reside
