Week End Market.
There was a large market this morning and the produce sold for the following prices: Veal, 10c to 14c per pound; butter, 35c per pound; eggs, 35c per dozen; potatoes, \$5 per barrel; rhubarb, 3c per pound; lettuce, 8c per bunch; live young pigs, \$4 each. This is the first time that only \$5 was asked for potatoes since the price went down, but some farmers are trying to get \$6 and \$6.50 for them and are not succeeding.

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CLAY SLIDE
KILLED EMPLOYE
AT BRICK YARD

Daniel Driscoll, Victim of Fatality at Ryan's Brickyard Yesterday Afternoon—Funeral Today.

Daniel Driscoll of this city, was killed at the brickyard of M. Ryan & Son shortly after four o'clock yesterday afternoon, by a slide of clay. The victim of the accident was sitting close to a clay bank at which he had been working. A huge mass of clay became detached from the bank and slid upon him. He was struck on the back of the neck and knocked down. Fellow employees went to his assistance but his injuries were so severe that death occurred within a few minutes. Dr. B. M. Mullin, coroner, was notified and viewed the body but decided an inquest unnecessary, the fatality having been entirely due to accident. The deceased had been employed at the brickyard for thirty-one years and was an expert in the clay pit where he had worked for twenty years. The late Daniel Driscoll was aged fifty-three years and was a son of the late Timothy Driscoll of Kingsclear. Three brothers and three sisters survive. They are Timothy and James of Boston, and Patrick of Harvey Station, Helena and Johanna married and living in the United States and Mrs. Brownrig of Harvey Station. The funeral took place at 2 o'clock this afternoon, interment being made at the Hermitage.

BEAR MADE
IT LIVELY FOR
THE HABITANT

James Savoie, a North Shore Man, was Badly Mauled by Bruin Near Cain's River.

A bear story which seems to be some what out of the ordinary, probably because it is true, comes from North Cain's on the line of the Transcontinental railway below McGivney Jct. It seems that one day this week a man named James Savoie, a habitant belonging to the Caraquet Shore, was walking along the track when he discovered a bear caught securely in the wire fence which protects the right of way. As he was armed with an axe and it would have been an easy matter for him to have despatched bruin, but it did not strike him that this would be the proper course to pursue. He thought it would be more heroic to take the animal alive, and his attempt to execute this hastily conceived plan almost cost him his life. With the aid of the axe he cut the bear loose and the animal instead of showing gratitude, sprang upon its deliverer, and gave him the worst mauling he ever had in his life. It tore his clothing and bit and scratched him in a terrible manner, and the only matter for surprise is that there was any life remaining in the man when bruin left him and ambled off to the woods. Savoie succeeded after a hard struggle in getting to his home, where after the lapse of some hours a doctor dressed his wounds. At last accounts he was progressing favorably and it is believed he will recover.

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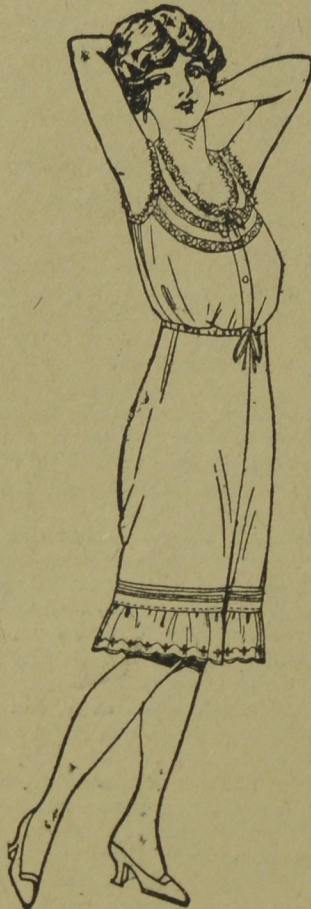
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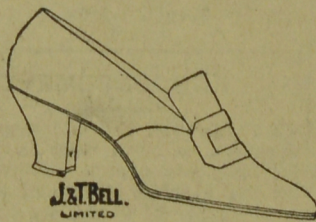
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
