SHOULD SEND A BIG FORCE

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

New York, Sept. 21. — Dr. Benjamin Rand of Harvard university, who has just returned from the western front, where he talked to persons of the British army, says that in his opinion the United States should send an army of two million men abroad to help wage the fight if the war with Germany is to be won.

A small expeditionary force, said Dr. Rand, would mean undue sacrifice of manpower, which experience England went through early in the war, because she could not help herself, being compelled to use what available troops were at her disposal.

Montreal, Sept. 22.—Flags of the Allied nations were flown from City Hall yesterday in celebration of the completion of the Quebec bridge. 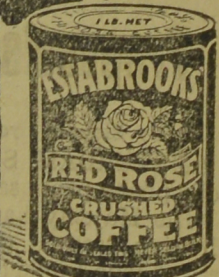

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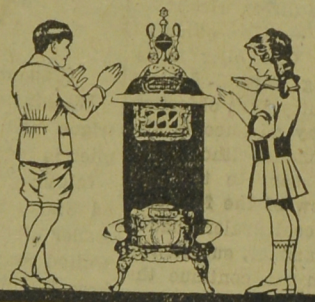
